Junior II. class, 1-4 hour Senior I. and Junior I. none. The best pupils do very much more than can be done in the time given but it is not required. Of course, the school cannot be blamed if pupils make a pretense of overwork to their parents or, if they drawl along an hour or two over 15 minutes work. Very many parents complain that pupils do not receive sufficient work to keep them off the street. An ef-fort is made to strike a middle

"There are some subjects, such as history," said Principal Plewes, where the pupil has to do a certain amount of work on his own ac-count. For the entrance the pupil has to get up all the British and Canadian history and it is impossible for all this to be taught in school. The pupil must read some at home and must learn the greater part for himself. The fault, if fault it be, lies with the curriculum. If they would only take one subject off the prescribed course or reduce the amount to be learned we would feel the difference and be duly grateful."
