SHAREHOLDERS CALLED ON.

AMOUNTS OWING ON ATLAS LOAN CO. STOCK.

List of Contributors Filed—\$750,000
Unpaid on Stock—\$480,400
Appears Charged Against A. E. Wallace.

Toronto, Sept. 24.—A list of the contributors of the insolvent Atlas Loan Company was laid before the Master in Ordinary by W. H. Hunter and J. Grayson Smith, at Osgoode Hall yesterday.

The list, which was made up from the books of the company, discloses fifty-eight names of people who are liable for sums varying from one hundred to several hundred thousand dollars.

Mr. A. E. Wallace, President of the company, is set down as having 5,254 shares in his name, with an unpaid balance on them of \$480,400. The liquidator found these shares opposite Mr. Wallace's name in the books, but he claims to hold a large number of the shares as agent for Ames & Co., whom he seeks to hold liable.

It was stated in court that Mr. Wallace had offered to assign all that he possessed for the benefit of the creditors, and the Master made an order permitting this, although all 50 Mr. Wallace's payments will be made on account and there will be no settlement.

The total amount owing is \$750,000. Among the contributors are two Toronto men, Messrs. John Flett and Wm. Morris, Rev. Messrs. Crossley and Hunter (the evangelists), Mrs. Crossley, the estate of the late Dr. McLarty, St. Thomas.
