BEACHVILLE,

A post village and station of the G.W.R., situated on the banks of the Thames, four miles west of Woodstock, and about the same distance from Ingersoll. Previous to the construction of the railway, considerable business was done here, and for a long time it was the post-office station for a large section of country to the north, east and south, before a post-office was established in Woodstock or Embro. Beachville and its immediate vicinity was among the first portions of the county settled, in consequence of which the farms are now in a high state of cultivation. There is ample water power in its vicinity for mill and factory purposes. The London and Hamilton macadamized and gravel road passes through the village; also the North Oxford and West Zorra gravel road. It has daily mails, and contains five church organizations, viz:—Roman Catholic, Presbyterian, Episcopal, Wesleyan Methodist and Baptist; two schools, one foundry and machine shop, owned and carried on by Mr. R. Whitelaw, in which are manufactured agricultural implements, mill gearing, steam engines, sawing machines, &c., &c.; one grist and flouring mill, two sawmills, of which that of Mr. J. Gray was established in 1863. It is 60 x 30 feet, 2 stories high. Six hands and an engine of 25 horse power are employed. Mr. James Nott turns out about 500 bushels per week of the very best lime from his kiln. Mr. N. Climenhegg manufactures rakes, wash boards, turned ware of all kinds, mop sticks, &c. There are also two shingle and turning factories, and two tanneries, three general stores, three groceries, three blacksmith shops, one waggon shop, three shoe shops, and three hotels. Population about 700.
