WRECK AT  
HAMILTON

Engineer Killed and Many  
Others Seriously  
Injured

Hamilton, Dec. 18.—Shortly after five o'clock this morning, the Chicago and New York Express on the Grand Trunk, travelling nearly two hours late, crashed into a freight train which was crossing the main line near Stoney Creek. William Walsh of Sarnia, engineer of the express, is dead as a result of the terrible injuries he received, while the life of Percy Ramsay, another trainman from Sarnia, is despaired of. He is frightfully scalded. Several passengers were jolted around, but none of them badly hurt, it was stated at the office of the superintendent here this morning.

As soon as word of the smash-up reached Hamilton, a special train with doctors and nurses was despatched to the scene. Walsh and Ramsay were hurried to the Hamilton hospital, where Walsh died shortly after being admitted.

Conductor Havers, in charge of the express, escaped injury, as did also Engineer Wilson and Conductor M. A. Cherry, of the freight.

The engines of both trains were badly wrecked, and the main line is piled high with debris. An exceptionally heavy fog prevailed at the time the accident occurred.
