The Halifax Herald says the following in Thursday's issue:

George E. Graham, general manager of the Dominion Atlantic Railway, is spending a few days in Halifax. He has just returned from Springfield, Mass., where he attended the National Dairy show, the largest and most representative of its kind in the world. Dairy cattle of the highest type were on exhibition. Mr. Graham's object in visiting the show was to gain first hand knowledge of the most modern dairying methods, best style of cattle for dairying and general purposes, etc., with a view to applying the information obtained, in assisting in the development of the dairying industry throughout the Annapolis Valley.

In connection with the above there is also a most interesting exhibit of dairying appliances, cream separators, sterilizers, etc., and last but not least a most creditable exhibit by the Dominion government of grains, grasses, cheese, butter, honey, etc., from practically all the Provinces—with the exception of Nova Scotia.

Mr. Graham was accompanied by R. J. Parker general passenger agent. They return to Kentville this afternoon.
