

CITY AND COUNTRY

From Friday Morning's Leader. Storey and Van Egmond are calling for tenders for the erection of eight houses for the R. N. W. M. P. Mayor Smith has let the contract for the large new business block to be erected by him from the plans of Storey & Van Egmond on Ross street at a cost of close upon \$38,000. A new telephone directory is now in course of preparation and all those subscribers wishing to have any change made in their addresses in the book should notify the local manager not later than this evening. The old Garrow lot on the corner of Lorne St. and Eleventh Avenue has been purchased by H. S. Meurill, who comes from the vicinity of Brockville, Ont. It is understood the price was close on \$10,000 and Mr. Meurill intends to erect on this lot a large block similar in construction to those building under construction in that vicinity. The Mounted Rifles were out on parade last night under the command of Capt. Carman and formations with different squadron formations with a precision that was marvelous, considering the few parades they have had. Thus far the parades have not been very well attended, about thirty out of 75 troopers turning out. The new uniforms have all arrived, arms and saddles. The Regina squadron are probably the first troops in the West to be served with the Ross rifles. The quartermaster-sergeant with two troopers to assist him has been busy for the last two days unpacking equipment and very shortly uniforms will be issued to those attending the drills.

From Saturday Morning's Leader. The Edna Southernland recital being got up by the St. Mary's Altar Society will be under the distinguished patronage of His Honour the Lieutenant Governor and Madame Forget. It is proposed to form a special committee of the City Council under whom the city police force will be placed. The matter will probably be dealt with this evening in a report from the Finance Committee. Mrs. T. Wilkinson has received word of the serious illness of her father at Grand Rapids and together with her daughter Hope, will leave on Monday, they expect to be absent two months and during that time their home on Albert street will be occupied by Dr. and Mrs. Steele.

The hall game between Regina and Indian Head last evening was abandoned after seven or eight innings had been played. Indian Head held a good lead at the close of play but the condition of the ground made good play absolutely impossible. Rev. Dr. Jordan, of Queen's University, Kingston, is in the city a guest of Mr. and Mrs. Fenwick of the Normal School. The reverend gentleman is one of the leading authorities on Biblical criticism. He will preach on Sunday morning in the Hamilton St. Methodist church and in the evening at Knox church. The graduates and friends of Queen's University resident in the city are giving an informal supper in his honor at the Owl restaurant on Monday evening.

The general manager of the Frost and Wood Co., R. J. Whyte, is expected in the city on Monday to confer with the company's provincial manager, F. Cooper, with a view to the building of a new and considerably larger warehouse at this point. In consequence Mr. F. Cooper will not be able to attend the approaching boards of trade convention at Prince Albert in his capacity of president of the Regina board and his place at the convention will be taken by the vice-president, A. E. Whitmore.

From Monday Morning's Leader. Ex-Chief Justice McGuire of Prince Albert is in the city in connection with the institution of the Knights of Columbus in the city. The first irrigation convention covering the provinces of Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia, will open in Calgary on the 17th of July next. Messrs. Wm. Newman & Co. are to be offered that portion of the contract for sidewalks, and a gutter previously offered to the Nelson Bros. company. W. H. A. Hill, who has been representing McCallum, Hill & Co. in the east for the past two months, returned to the city early Saturday morning. Dr. H. G. Nyblett will act as regimental surgeon for the local squadron of the 16th Mounted Rifles. The doctor has been appointed lieutenant of the army medical corps.

The ranks of Saskatchewan journalism continue to increase. The last publications to make their appearance are The Earl Grey Gazette, The Lemberg Leader and The Vonda Advance. Commencing today the local trains between Moose Jaw and Winnipeg, both east and westbound, will carry mail between all points, with the exception of stations between Portage la Prairie and Winnipeg. Burford Hooke, news editor of The Morning Leader, leaves this morning for Prince Albert to represent this paper at the Associated Boards of Trade convention for Alberta and Saskatchewan which opens in the northern city tomorrow. Three passengers from the wrecked train at Francis were treated at the Victoria hospital Saturday morning. W. F. Bodwell, whose head and face were cut, and whose hip was injured, remained at the hospital, but the others left after treatment.

Victor Stubbings, of the C. P. R. commercial telegraph office, leaves this morning for Prince Albert to assist in the handling of the heavy business which will result from the Boards of Trade convention. The C. P. R. has placed an instrument in the convention chamber in the Prince Albert city hall. At the meeting held on Saturday evening for the purpose of forming a boating club, it was decided that the Regina Boat Club be organized forthwith and a committee was appointed for the purpose of drafting a constitution and obtaining information with regard to a

site for boat house. The committee will report at a meeting to be held Thursday evening next. The chair at Saturday's meeting was taken by C. E. D. Wood, while A. C. Barrett acted as secretary.

From Tuesday Morning's Leader. In addition to the large number of Dominion Day events noted in The Leader yesterday, there will be celebrations at Carleton Place, Oxbow and Yellow Grass. A. T. Brook, who has been conducting a real estate business here, has found a partnership with Mr. Caldwell. The new firm will be known as Brook & Caldwell.

Mr. Smith will return to Regina for the banquet to Premier Scott on Friday evening. Professor Osborne of Wesley College, Winnipeg, arrives in Regina today to take part in the progress made by the Capital of Saskatchewan. Just now it is the university professor an opportunity to carry out his desire of seeing something of western progress.
