You can't keep men straight

by such laws, and my experience has been that it only makes men and boys more crooked and meaner. You are going to have a heavy flow of American capital and enterprise over here in these oil fields and you must not do anything to hamper them. They must have good to stop at and must have everything they want. Business Americans do not over-indulge, but when they want a glass of beer or wine they want it bad and will have it. We Americans don't want to have any trade with a people who have to be kept straight by law or sober by ordinance, and for myself I won't have anything to do with a man who has to be made to be good or is only honest because it pays best to be so. I want men sober and honest on principle. You can't shut liquor out of a State or Province while it is running like mill streams in adjoining States or Provinces. We tried it in different States and soon quit it. Down in Maine where I timbered for ten years they have a prohibiting law, What's the result? The result is that wine and beer, being bulky, are not to be found, while vile whiskey and gin can be had as easily as milk and the State is filled with bums, bummers, law breakers and perjurers. I am told you have good license laws but they are not enforced. Well, enforce them. If you can't enforce the laws you have how in the world are you going to this one which seeks to deprive a man altogether of his glass of wine or beer. I have been temperance man all my life, but take a glass of wine and pint of bitter ale every day. Keep the hotel keepers you have up to the

TORONTO CAPITALISTS TO HAR-NESS NIAGARA FORCES.

William Mackenzie and Mr. Frederic Nicholls Interested-Fearing the Results of American Monopoly.

Toronto, Nov. 25 .- Toronto cap-Niagara power being all monopolized by Americans, have planned a new company, the leaders of which have already approached the Niagara Falls Park Commissioners, with a view to securing privileges. These will be along the lines of the rights already conceded to the Canadian Niagara Power Company and the Ontario Power Company, both of which have very large works now under construction on the Canadian side. An engineering authority has stated that when these two works and the two already operating on the American side are in full operation, about 25 per cent. of the water passing down the Nlagara River will have been diverted for power purposes. It is understood that the present applicants propose erecting works at a point between those already located.

The applicants are understood to be a syndicate which includes Mr. William Mackenzie, President of the Toronto Railway, and Mr. Frederic Nicholls, Managing Director of the Canadian General Electric Company. It was under-stood that the companies in which both these gentlemen are interested expected to obtain power from the Ontario Power Company, and their present appearance in the role of applicants lends color to the belief that the parties have failed to agree on the question of terms.
