Public Library Board Will Consider Offer From the County Council.

New Member--Many Accounts Passed-Other Business of importance.

The regular monthly meeting of the Library Board was held last evening. All the members were present with the exception of the Mayor, who was out of the city. The minutes of the December and January meetings were read and adopted.

A communication was read from T.
C. Macnabb, secretary of the Public School Board, appointing J. W. Humphrey as new member in S. B. Arnold's ace, and also the re-appointment of

Albert Sheldrick. Another communication was read from J. C, Fleming, county clerk, telling of the proposition of the county council, which is as follows—"That we recommend a grant of \$100 to Chatham Public Library on the condition that the townships of Harwich, Raliciph Degree and Chatham beauty eigh, Dover, and Chatham have the privilege of using the library free.

'After a good deal of discussion on

the subject, it was decided on motion of Messrs. Charteris and Scullard, that a committee consisting of Messrs. Scullard, Twohey and Sheldrick, be appointed to look into the matter and f the board had the power, to extend to the use of the county and also if he grant was to be a yearly one.

The committee reported that they had ordered \$50 or \$60 worth of books on approval. The reading room committee advis-



SUCCESS OF **OUR SOLDIERS**

British Win Important Series in South Africa-After Dewet.

Delarey's Commando Surprised -- Wessels Completely Routed-Good Work.

London, Feb. 5.-Lord Kitchener has ent the following message from Pretoria :- "Major Leader's force surprised Delarev's commando, killed seven and captured 131. The British casualties were slight. No British were killed.

London, Feb. 5.—The British pursuit of Gen. De Wet has been successful to the extent that his last gun has been captured, and commandant Wessels, one of his principal lieutenants, has been routed. Lord Kitchener sent the news in a despatch from Pretoria dated Feb. 4, as follows :-THE ROUT OF WESSELS' FORCE

"Byng's column, while proceeding towards Liebenburgvlei, after a night march, attacked and routed a considerable force of the enemy under Commandant Wessels. fifteen-pounder and a pom-pom taken from Firman's column, and also Boer pom-pom (that was the last gun munition, 150 horses and 100 mules. The Boer casualties were five men killed, six wounded and 27 men captured.

THE ENEMY SCATTERED. Among the killed was Field Corner Vessels. Among the prisoners is Captain Muller, of the Staats Artillery The enemy was scattered. Our casual-

ties were slight. CAPTURED BY NATIONAL SCOUTS. "The National Scouts, near Middleburg, Cape Colony, captured 13 pris-

PLUMER STILL AT IT. Plumer, near Amersfoort, Transvaal, captured seven prisoners and 500 head of cattle.

ANOTHER CAPTURE. "General Gilbert Hamilton captured 32 prisoners.

Bloemfontein, Feb. 5.-The su of General Bruce Hamilton's night marches in the Eastern Transvaal has not been repeated in Eastern Orange Colony, Gen. De Wet's favorite cam-paigning ground.
