An Ontario Expert Wanted.

Toronto, Nov. 1.—It is understood that the Government of Nova Scotia has offered to one of the expert officials of the Ontario Agricultural Department the principalship of the new agricultural college at Truro. The building was recently completed by the Nova Scotian Government at a cost of \$25,000, not including equipment, and is on the Provincial farm at Trure, where in former years farm at Trure, where in former years small classes in practical agriculture have been carried on. The wooden school building on the ground was burned down five years ago, and the Government, which had long been urged to do so, then decided to build the present college. Mr. F. L. Fuller, who has for many years been prescribed by the form who was superintendent of the farm, who was at the Parliament Buildings yester-day, said he was not in a position. to make any announcement at the present time regarding the principal-ship of the college.

Ottawa, Nov. 1.—Yesterday was Mr. Blair's last day as chairman of Mr. Blair's last day as chairman of the Railway Commission. When he left the office yesterday he was, as he termed it, a free man. After a few days, he will go to Eastern Canada on a visit, which probably will last for a couple of months. He has outlined a visit to St. Louis and later to England. Canadian Flour in Japan.

Ottawa, Nev. 1 .- Alex. McLean reports from Japan for the first six months of the calendar year amengst Japanese imports, flour stood alone as the representative of Canadian trade. But the increasing importations of that article save the situations. tions of that article save the altuation from discouragement. During the eight months from January to August, 70,852,496 pounds of flour, valued at \$81,755, were brought in from Canada, as compared with 448,701 pounds, valued at \$5,440, for the same period of the year previous. ious.


