An adjourned meeting of the lot-holders of the Grand Erie Dike was held in Evangelina Hall, Lower Horton, on Saturday last.

Considerable discussion was indulged in over the question of proportioning the assessment for the outlay.

Some members present expressed their unwillingness to pay for the benefit of having their names enclosed.

Some present thought that the residents of Long Island, as receiving a great benefit in having the dike owners as responsible for the maintenance should remove it gratuitously.

A motion was at length made by A. McN. Patterson, seconded by J. S. Hamilton, authorizing the commission to proceed to erect the dike according to law within a space of twelve months.
