
GRAFTING WAR—ready for use at RAND'S.

Sergeant Atwell Died at Amherst.

A sad death took place at Highland View Hospital, Amherst, on April 21st, when Sergeant Aubrey Grant Atwell, of the Sixth Mounted Rifles, passed away after only a few days illness of pneumonia, following measles. Sergeant Atwell was a son of Martin Atwell, of Black River, and volunteered with the C. M. R. at Kentville, rapidly advancing in rank to Sergeant.

He was a man of exemplary Christian character, beloved by his comrades and during his short stay in Amherst made many friends. He was a member of the Baptist church at Black River. His mother arrived in Amherst just half an hour after her son had passed away.

Besides his parents he leaves three brothers and four sisters. The body was brought to Wolfville by the D. A. R. train Saturday morning and taken to the home of his parents at Black River. C. Squadron, of which he was a member, accompanied the body from the undertakers to the train.

The many friends of Rev. G. T. Bryant will be glad to learn that he has arrived safely in England. He is now at Shorecliffe as a member of the Depot Company C. A. M. C. for overseas service.

Miss Bessie Elderkin, missionary in China, returned home recently to visit her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Elderkin. Miss Elderkin stopped for a short time at the San Francisco Exposition en route.

A Wolfville Hero.

The many friends of Mrs. Rachel deW. Archibald will regret to learn that she was informed by telegram received April 29th a. m. that her son, Leon Archibald, was wounded in the late engagement at Ypres.

Leon was with the B. Sc. Class '06 of Acadia University, and took his D. L. S. degree later in Regina, enlisting for C. Engineering work with a Corps of Guides at that place August 10th, 1914.

He had been engaged in Dominion Land Survey work with C. M. Weeks throughout Saskatchewan and Alberta, Green, C. E., in Winnipeg Lake district for Government purposes, and during the past two years with Reilly Dawson & Reilly firm of C. Engineers, etc., of Regina.

His work has been varied, lending valuable experience in dealing with sterling men of 'the West,' covering ground requiring intuitive skill, acute ability, a cast iron body, with which characteristics Leon seemed to be fully endowed. This preparation fitted him for the strenuous life which he has been obliged to live during the past nine months.

When the 'Call to Arms' came to Canada's sons from the Mother Country Leon had just left a hospital in Regina, where he had been operated on for appendicitis. Notwithstanding this he was among the first to find his place with the Corps of Guides, then being formed from engineers, etc., in that city, proceeding at once to Valcartier, and sailing from there with the First Contingent. His letter describing the voyage of the fleet from Gaspe to England provides particularly interesting reading.

When the Corps of Guides was broken up he, with twelve or more companions from Regina, joined P. Company, and Infantry Brigade, 5th Battalion, training as Battalion Scout, and continuing C. Engineer work as before. He was serving in this capacity when he was struck down.

His letters to the home people all through have been most interesting, inspiring, optimistic, full of patriotic spirit for, as he puts it, 'the flag that never comes down.'

Quoting from a letter of Oct. 17, to his mother: 'Few people realize just how much they owe to England and how much the true meaning of 'Britannia rules the waves.' If we stay at home where would Canada be in a few years? Think of her sending a fleet such as this, in such times as these. That's what it means to live under a British flag. Now when we have everything to lose, and everything to win in it any wonder that every man who sees the matter fairly wants to line up alongside and do his little best? . . . I know that in your heart you are glad to have a representative at the front. Bats with eight aces are continually around our ships as we are laying in the harbor awaiting transference. Evidently the Canuck is somewhat of a curiosity. In any case a good deal is expected of him and I am sure that he will live up to expectation.'

Writing from France March 21st, after first experience in the trenches, he says: 'I am more glad than ever that I came for this surely is the place for any able bodied man who has enjoyed the protection of a flag that will never come down.' There is a vast difference between reading and actually seeing, and well may the people on the untried outside congratulate themselves for its different here. However we hope it will soon be over.

We expect to place in our next issue some interesting extracts from the pen of our Wolfville hero, of whom we are all justly proud.

The death of Sir Robert Weatherbee, formerly Chief Justice of Nova Scotia, took place at the Infirmary, Halifax, on Tuesday, April 27th. He was 79 years of age. Sir Robert was appointed Judge of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia in 1879, and elevated to the Chief Justice ship in 1905. The late King Edward knighted him in 1906.

Hon. Wallace Graham, senior Judge of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia has been appointed Chief Justice of the Province of Nova Scotia, succeeding Sir Charles Townshend, who retired from the Bench a few weeks ago.
