### BEAVERS GROUP RECEIVES PRAISE

Local Junior Red Cross Group Was  
Highly Spoken of by Miss Lawson,  
Director of Junior Red Cross for  
New Brunswick.

At the Red Cross Provincial Convention held recently in St. John much praise was given to the Junior Red Cross Societies throughout the Province and to the Beavers of the Hartland school came special praise. Miss Lawson, who has charge of the Junior Red Cross in New Brunswick, said that this society sent in the most work and the best and wrote the best letters of any society in the Province. After making this statement she asked if there was anyone present from Hartland. Mrs. G. F. Bolster, who was the delegate and was present, responded, saying she was proud to be representing Hartland and said she would carry back to the Beavers the good report given of them. This she did at a meeting of the Juniors held recently at which a very nice program was rendered and to which parents were invited, quite a number of whom availed themselves of the invitation.

The Beavers is the Society of Grades 3 and 4 and is in charge of Miss Annie L. Kingston, teacher. Besides the work done at Christmas it was suggested to the Beavers by their leader that each one save what pennies they could to also send in to the head office. This they did, the sum of \$2.45 was realized. The Beavers received a letter from Miss Lawson thanking them for this extra donation and told them that up to the night before Christmas they had not decided in what way their money would be spent, when in walked a man saying he had been out of work for some time and had nothing to buy his children's Christmas dinner with and appealed to the Red Cross for help. The society had another small sum of money on hand so they put the two together and had enough to provide a dinner for these little children. When this was read to the Beavers, they were very much interested and were visibly affected. This and many other splendid instances go to prove what a splendid organization the Red Cross is and what a great thing the Junior Red Cross is in a great many more ways than one.

Besides the Beavers there are six other Junior Red Cross Societies in the school and they are all doing splendid work. Recently they have been very busy making valentines which they send to the head office at St. John where they are distributed to the children at the hospitals and homes, thereby spreading sunshine and cheer to those poor unfortunate little ones.

### IVAN C. RAND WINS IN GLOUCESTER CO.

Attorney-General Defeats J. L. Ryan and Gains Seat in House—Majority of 1,919.

Ivan C. Rand, the government candidate in the Gloucester County by-election defeated J. L. Ryan, the opposition candidate by a majority of 1,919 votes. This gives the Attorney-General a seat in the Legislative Assembly and assures him of the re-election of his position. The downfall of the Veniot candidate in Moncton several months ago was heralded far and wide as a slap in the face for the Veniot administration and the federal government's attitude toward the railway centre of Moncton. Mr. Rand took his defeat and Premier Veniot was held in his return. He attempted to elect Mr. Rand in the County of Gloucester and his efforts were successful even if Mr. Rand was an outsider. This fact coupled with the fact that the successful candidate plainly shows the attitude of the people of Gloucester County towards the Premier who has served them for over three years in a most satisfactory manner.
