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Some of the Stolen Goods Have Been Recovered Where They Fell Off Vehicle.

A complete bed, a number of mattresses, some pillows and upwards of 100 sheets were stolen from the D. S. C. R. Hospital here on Saturday night. The missing property is valued at more than \$250, and was taken from the lower wing of the hospital during the night. It is said that the thief was removed from the hospital area and was taken to a wheelbarrow being used a great deal outside the buildings during the night, but this is said to have been partly explained by the night watchman reporting that he had found a considerable amount of coal during the night. Yesterday the robbery was reported to the city police and Sheriff Hawthorn visited the D. S. C. R. building yesterday, made some investigations and measurements and later visited one or two boarding houses in the West End, evidently believing they might find some trace of the missing articles there. It is said that the stolen goods, several sheets and a pillow which were being assembled previous to being offered for sale. It was said today there was a possibility of an automobile having been employed to remove some of the stolen goods. Several sheets and a pillow or two have been recovered they were found near the entrance to the D. S. C. R. grounds, where they had evidently fallen off the vehicle in which they were being removed.

Sheriff Secures Beer

On Writ of Replevin
 Under a writ of replevin, which was signed by Dr. T. C. Allen, registrar of the Supreme Court, this morning, Sheriff Hawthorn this afternoon demanded possession of the 51 cases of beer, which had been seized last Friday by Chief of Police Finley, Patrolman Murray forbade the right to take the beer, but he removed the beer had been wrongfully seized, inasmuch as it had been taken from the cellar of a private residence, Chief Finley, who is out of town today, claimed the beer was consigned to the Enterprise Bottling Company and had been seized, he said, from licensed property. Sheriff Hawthorn said the beer would be returned to the owner when it had been stored there. Meanwhile Chief Finley is said to have taken samples of the beer to St. John for analysis.

Aldermen Ready to Criticize Employing Police to Enforce Prohibition

By the use of force, workmen employed by the Fredericton Society of St. Andrew's this morning commenced the removal of the yellow paint with which the statue of Robert Burns on Parliament Square, was smeared by U. N. B. students on Friday night. There is some fear expressed, however, that the acid will damage the bronze figure. The paint which was used by the students in "decorating" the statue of Burns, and the concrete sidewalk in front of the Post Office was of a quick drying variety which produced a brilliant surface, and it is said to have been floor paint. By the use of three colors—red, black and yellow—the artists were able to reproduce the colors of the college colors of both the U. N. B. and Mount Allison, which that day had played football at Sackville. Upper classmen at U. N. B. and Mount Allison do not hesitate to declare themselves as entirely out of sympathy with such acts of vandalism as the defacing of the Burns monument. One prominent upper classman declared this morning that the blame rested with members of the Sophomore Class. "There are a bunch of Sophomores who have been doing a lot of rough-neck stuff which has got all the student body in bad," he said. "They got even with the institution last year and they have been beyond control ever since."

LOCAL VENDORS WITHOUT LICENSES ARE CARRYING ON

Both the Wholesale and Retail Licenses Under Prohibition Act Have Expired


CHIEF INSPECTOR IS AWAY IN NOVA SCOTIA

Premier Foster Expressed His Surprise That Arrangements Were Not Made

Licensed vendors in Fredericton who dispense liquor under the Prohibition Act are "carrying on" today as they have before under similar circumstances, despite the fact that all licenses expired this morning. Chief of Police Finley was out of town today and was said to be in St. John getting samples of the beer which was seized on Friday from the Enterprise Bottling Company early so as to be ready when the case resulting from the seizure comes up in the Police Court on Thursday. District Chief Fraser Saunders said the matter of licenses would have to await the return of Rev. W. D. Wilson, chief inspector, and another at his residence this morning. He said the information that he was to leave Cape Breton, where he had been in connection with the referendum campaign in Nova Scotia, today for home. When Premier Foster was asked why the chief inspector and another were not here to see to it that the information as to what was to happen as a result of the licenses having expired. "You can say that I expressed myself as somewhat surprised that nothing had been done to meet such a situation as the beer trade," replied Premier Foster, who added that he couldn't give any information as to what would be done. He said a commission to administer the Act had not been appointed as yet.


