A gentleman who has studied him up somewhat gives this information: "The popular idea is that it is the beetle itself that does all the eating and destruction to vegetation. This is a mistake. It is its larva, or grub, which spoils our potato fields, the beetle being comparatively harmless Let me exlain how this is: In the fall the full grown beetle goes down into the ground, and there remains torpid all winter. In the spring, say about the latter part of May or first of June, it appears over ground, and commences the work of procreation. The female selects any vegetation, but preferably potato tops, on which to deposit her eggs. Each female insect lays from ten to thirty yellowish eggs, which she deposits on the under side of the leaf. If potatoes are up the eggs are deposited near the top of the stalk, where the leaves are young and tender. If the weather is warm, these eggs are hatched in from eight to ten days. 




