BRITAIN WILL SEND FLEET ON A CRUISE

Will Touch at Many Points in Different Parts of the World.

A LONG CRUISE

WASHINGTON, Saturday.—England is about to follow the example of President Roosevelt in sending a fleet of battleships and cruisers on a trip around the world, for the purpose of bringing home to her various colonial dependencies a notion of her naval supremacy and of her power to furnish adequate maritime protection against any danger which they may fear of foreign invasion and attack.

Of course the despatch of the fleet in question will depend on the peaceful settlement of the troubles which have arisen in the southeast of Europe.

At the time when the visit of one American battleship to Australia was first announced attention was called to the regret expressed in influential quarters in England that there was no British naval force of corresponding importance in Australian waters to take part in welcoming them there and to the fears entertained in London with regard to the impression likely to be caused thereby in the antipodes.

These apprehensions have been realized, and the utterances of statesmen and of politicians as well as of the public press, in Australia and New Zealand leave no doubt as to the existence of the conviction today among the white population there that in the event of trouble with Japan, which is what they dread more than anything else they would have to look to the United States and to her navy for assistance and protection rather than to Great Britain.

It is for the purpose of counteracting and removing this popular impression in the antipodes and of assuring the people there by means of a visible demonstration that the English navy is double the size of that of every other nation in the world, and fully powerful enough to furnish maritime protection to all her colonial dependencies, no matter how remote, that a great British battleship and cruiser squadron is now about to be sent on a progress round the world, similar to that devised by President Roosevelt for the American fleet.

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Three criminal cases to come up before His Honor.

TRUE BILLS

(Special News Service.)

DALHOUSIE, N. B., Tuesday.—The November term of the District Court county court opened today, at 11 a. m., Judge McLatche presiding. Lawyers in court were W. A. Trueman, A. T. LeBlanc, James S. Harquail. There was a full attendance of justices, called from different parts of the county, and a great many spectators.

Three criminal cases will engage the attention of the court this week, as follows:—

The King vs. Charles Debra, larceny.

The King vs. Arthur Neilson, burglary.

The King vs. Christiana Tremblay, larceny.

True bills were found by the grand jury in each case, and as the prisoners were brought into court to be arraigned, each one answered in a firm voice "not guilty" to the question put by the clerk of the court, "are you guilty, or not guilty?"

The first case taken up was that of the King vs. Charles Debra, for stealing money in Campbellton. The Crown is represented by W. A. Trueman.

In the above case the prisoner was found guilty of offence charged and sentenced to three years imprisonment.

In the observatory of Columbia university is one of the most accurate clocks in the world. It has run for several months with a mean error of only 13-1000 of a second, and a maximum error of 38-1000 of a second per day. That means that it does not vary more than half a second a month or six seconds in a year.

Compare this with the first pocket timepiece, the "Animated Egg of Newton," which requires "winding" twice a day, and "rattling" an hour and a half in the same time! Compare it with the highest priced watches manufactured today, which often vary more than 10 seconds a week, and you will have some idea of the refinements in the science of measuring time. Yet even this accuracy is surpassed by some famous timepieces, if the trade magazines are to be believed. There have been accounts in them of clocks or watches that have not varied less than a second in periods so long as ten years.

The clock of the University of Columbia is an astronomical clock. It is surrounded by a glass case in which a partial vacuum is maintained, and in order that the case may not be opened or disturbed the winding is done automatically by electricity. The clock is set up in a room especially constructed to keep it free from a jar or vibration. The temperature and barometric conditions are maintained practically constant, and every possible precaution is taken to minimize the errors of the running rate.

It is not generally appreciated that clocks of the present type, although used as far back as the twelfth century, and possibly earlier, were but fair timekeepers, until some centuries later. In fact it has only been within the last few decades that really accurate clocks have been manufactured. Those which the astronomers used in their observations, at the end of the last century, are so unreliable that modified forms of the water clocks of the ancients were often employed as checks upon them. Galileo's discovery of the isochronism of the pendulum from the swinging chandelier in the church of Pisa was of a great value in its application to the measurement of time. The inventions of the mercurial and compensating pendulums have added materially in cutting down the errors of the running rate and controlling the motions of clock mechanism.

Power refereed satisfactorily, but no decisions were given.

NEW I. C. R. SHOPS NOW BEING USED. (Special News Service.) MONCTON, N. B., Tuesday.—One hundred and thirty-five men who were shunted to the new shops, where they are now awaiting repairs. There were about 27 cars of material transferred from the old shops to the new ones today, when work is under way. Forty cars can be repaired per week.

BYE-ELECTIONS TO BE HELD AT ONCE. (Special News Service.) ST. JOHN, N. B., Tuesday.—The abolition day will be a week previous. The government candidate in Northumberland, will be Ernest Hutchison, while a convention will be held in a few days to choose a standard bearer in Carleton County.

MARINE ENQUIRY HAVING RESULTS. (Special News Service.) QUEBEC, Tuesday.—Captain Watson and Perron, are working like beavers, at day and night sessions lasting until midnight, will be held in order to get through if possible by Saturday.
