A reporter who visited Mr. Ross late last night at an address on Shuter street had an interddress on Shuter street had an inter ting conversation with that enterpris ing gentleman. Over a pipeful of tobacco Mr. Ross told his end of the story and defended his action in the matter.

defended his action in the matter. His first expression was of surprise that the letters had so soon found their way into the press, but he assured the reporter that they were written in per-fect good faith, and that his intentions were honorable in the matter.
