Troops generally move in columns. The usual column is four men abreast, two ranks comprising a squad, with the corporal as the man on the left in the rear rank. They go into the firing line in "extended order," sometimes referred to as a akirmish line. Troops are sent into battle or engagement as the diring line, the supply it and the reserve. The tactical unit in line of battle or engagement is the battalion.
