League Hockey

The Championship Final — Brilliant Game Between Crescents and Feildians — Blue and White "Half Moon" Champions Recover the Cup by a Score of Two Goals to Love—Finest Exhibition for Years.

Before the record assemblage of spectators for the season a big crowd of enthusiastic followers of the exciting ice game of puck and stick, and which included His Excellency the Governor and suite, as well as a thoroughly representative class of citizens generally, the blue and white champions of 1908 asserted their supremacy and placed the standard of the Crescents at the top of the table for 1910 after the best display of fast and fairly clean hockey seen since our P. E. I. friends, the Abegweits, visited our shores a few years ago.

In closing our minutes of record of Friday's match between these great rivals for Saturday's Telegram, we ventured to predict a record attendance at next meeting, and that such would be the case was early evidenced last night when we got in the vicinity of the scribbles "pen" at 7.20. Punctually at 7.30 p.m. the strains of the National Anthem announced the arrival of His Excellency Sir Ralph Williams and suite, who were graciously received with the respect due to the representative of Royalty, and took their seats in the southern box, or band stand, where they could command a fine view of the game as it proceeded. At 7.35 the players entered the arena amidst the plaudits of spectators, both teams getting a hearty reception. Feildians had one change, White resuming his old place instead of Anderson; whilst Crescents put on the same seven that won on Friday night, and as in that match they defended eastern net for first half. 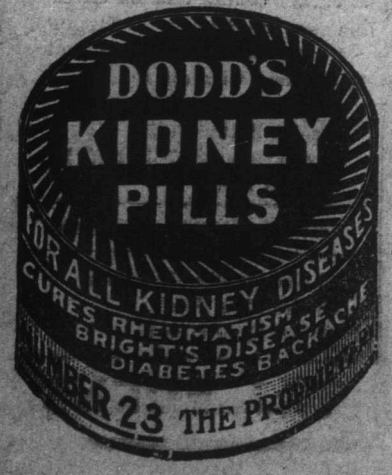
THE GAME.

A start was made at 7.40 on a splendid sheet of ice, and the opening was almost a replica of Friday night, viz., a Feildian rush for Burnham's end at a fast pace, and a score seemed imminent. Gus Herder and Marshall being a bit unsteady. Burnham cleared and play was transferred to mid-rink, where it raged hard and fast for a few minutes. Then Marshall on a run "knocked out" the puck and a referee favored the Feildians. Gus Herder with a lift shot cleared to other end, and Jeffrey retaliated by trying his hand at the same game, an effort that almost told, Gus missing and Burnham just clearing his net at short range. Then Trapnell had a brilliant run on left wing, being just blocked by Jeffrey, who lifted. Then off-side interruptions marred the game and chances for Feildians particularly were lost. The game now grew most exciting, and amidst the cheers of their supporters in turn both teams put forth their best efforts to start the scoring. Crescents were the most aggressive and

for a time pressed their opponents hard in their own territory, shot after shot being sent towards Strang without effect, as the custodian proved very effective and held the fort well. The blue and white champions continued forcing the pace, and when pressing hard Pearce infringed and got a term on the fence. Then Feildians had a short term of pressing. Tait was getting off on one of his roving expeditions but got blocked by Marshall, who hooked a beauty which rebounded from the Feildian goal post. Immediately after Hubert Herder, close in, just missed netting, his finishing efforts being a bit weak. Lift shots from the rival points were now in evidence for a short period. Then Feildians made a determined onslaught on Crescent citadel, but defence could not be penetrated. From this till the half time bell rang play was kept up at a terrific pace with fairly even exchanges without any scoring, both teams leaving the ice for the usual interval of rest.

Second Half.

On a resumption at 8.20 Feildians at once assumed aggressive tactics, but glaring off-side touches spoiled scoring chances. After a few minutes of very fast play Tait, when on a run, was tripped up by Marshall, George being sent to the penalty box, where a minute afterward he was joined by his clubmate Pearce, who also infringed. With two of their opponents off the ice there seemed a scoring chance for the Feildians, who were encouraged by shouts of sympathy from their supporters. Try as they might, however, they could not penetrate Crescent defence, which proved impregnable all at assaults. Marshall had just resumed playing when the Rhodes scholar (Tait) indulged in trying the tripping game on George, which he managed successfully at the expense of a three minute term in the pen. Then the Crescents made a raid on Strang's quarters, and after some lightning passing efforts Trapnell got possession close in and netted first Crescent goal amidst thunderous applause, when the game in this half was eleven minutes old. From the referee Feildians again pressed hard, determined on getting the equalizer, and for a few minutes had the best of the exchanges. Tait, White and Pinsent in turn had successive tries, but Gus Herder and Burnham were at their best and defied all efforts to find the net. Again Crescents got very aggressive and Marshall put in a splendid bit of play, fairly sweeping the rink and only failed to tally through stumbling in front of Feildian net, where he remained hors de combat for a short time, play being suspended. On his resuming hard and fast play succeeded, Crescents being the most aggressive and keeping better together than their opponents. Eventually Hubert Herder, who played brilliantly all through, got an opening and the score stood after 20 minutes of time had gone—Crescents, 2; Feildians, 0. Immediately after referee the Crescents' centre was sent to the boards for infringing and again Feildians pressed hard. Tait put in some brilliant roving work, but was closely watched by the other side and blocked when getting dangerous, and taken all round the Crescents were evidently the stronger team and kept the balance play was continued at a furious pace till the time bell rang without further scoring, the incidents of note, worthy of recording being the penalizing of White for infringing and the laying out of Marshall (who was displaying brilliant form), who received a nasty blow in the region of the stomach, some six minutes before the close. With play in Feildian territory and Crescents pressing the bell rang.

In the three matches played between these rivals for championship honors the Crescents scored 8 goals against their opponents 7, so it is really by the odd goal as represented in the earned goals on full table of points that they gained the championship. Truly a close run.

FINAL COMMENT.

Well, it is all over at last, and after a rather protracted season the Crescents or "half moon" chaps are shining bright in the firmament of Terra Novian hockey as champions of the League for 1910. We extend hearty congratulations to Gus Herder, the brilliant point and captain of the champion team, and also to his gallant clubmates for their grand finishing efforts as witnessed in their last two games. They had certainly hard luck in losing the services, through accident, of their very capable custodian, Burnham, early in the season, who, however, contributed largely to their success in the end. Shake all round boys; keep together, and now that you've got it (the cup), try to keep it.

Congratulations are also extended to our friend Jeffrey, who, like Gus, is also the shining point and captain of the runners up, viz., "present" and "old" Feildians; also to all the members of his team, and whom we thought at one period of the fixtures were going to win right through. Yes, we had been anticipating the great send off Tait (our Rhodes scholar) would have, viz., as belonging to the champion hockey teams of both inter-collegiate and senior League, and the record he would carry across for Oxford athletes to ponder over.

However, better luck next time to all Feildians. As for Tait, the one and only Tait, may he gain fresh laurels, not only in athletics, but also in all his studies for the future career. Thus for the present season finish. Exit.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir—At a request of a number of citizens a public meeting was held in the Court House here on the 4th inst., for the purpose of discussing the feasibility of formulating a system of Municipal Government for this town. At 8.15 His Honor Judge Oke, came forward and read the names of its citizens whose request he had conveyed the meeting, and briefly explained its object. His Honor was then unanimously appointed to the chair, and Mr. Wm. Gullfoyle was appointed secretary.
Discussion was then freely entered upon by the following gentlemen:—W. Maddigan, J. Davis, J. D. Mann, Dr. Strapp, W. J. Jeans, H. Archibald and T. Hanrahan, the consensus of opinion being that Harbor Grace badly needed some form of civic government, and that were a Municipal Council established it would have the effect of inducing capitalists to come in and avail of the many natural resources possessed by Harbor Grace for manufacturing and other purposes.

At the conclusion a call for a volunteer committee to draw up civic regulations, to be afterwards submitted to a public meeting, was made by T. Hanrahan, and twenty of those present responded, appointing Mr. Hanrahan as their chairman, and thus closed, with the singing of God
