The difference might not be so marked here, where industrical conditions are necessarily more restricted, but there can be little doubt that the apathetic attitude which is taken by a lot of our young men towards this subject is causing a tremendous loss to themselves, their families, and

the country. If the Government would take steps to enquire into local industrial condi tions, with a view to more widely encouraging technical education for the masses, I believe that the majority of our local manufacturing establishments would not be working on short time, as they are to-day, because the increased efficiency of the workmen would make possible the production of goods which would stand comparison. in the open market, with anything that can be imported.

Such a condition of affairs would assuredly mean much to the future of Newfoundland
