Pastor Webber's Message to His People.

At the close of the sermon at Cochran Street Methodist Church last evening the Rev. W. H. Webber made the following reference to the Thanksgiving services held last Sunday: "It with a feeling of reverent thankfulness that I announce to you the fact of the very satisfactory result of the Thanksgiving collection that was taken in this church last Sunday. C. E. T. S. Celebration.

Being Temperance Sunday, yesterday was duly celebrated at C. of E. Cathedral. At 8 a.m. Holy Eucharist was offered on behalf of the work of the Society in this district, the celebrant being Rev. Canon White, President. He was assisted by Rev. J. Bell, Chairman of the local branch. There was a large attendance, although the weather was very cold. At Evensong the office was taken by Rev. Canon Bell. Hymns were sung suitable to the occasion. Rev. C. H. Barton was the preacher and his text was, "Every good gift and every perfect boon is from above and cometh down from the Father of light. If thy foot ensnare thee, cut it off, for it is better to enter halt into heaven than be cast into hell." This expressed the teaching of our Divine Lord on Temperance. Although alcohol is a gift from God its abuse has brought ruin on mankind and drunkenness has played havoc in Christian lands. The time was come when a decision should be made as to whether we should cut off the limb that is diseased or allow it to work our ruin. The preacher believed that we should have a more drastic remedy like Local Option. He urged all to join the Society and to pray for the good cause. He warned all from ridiculing the drunkard. They should rather pity and pray for him and help to save him and his family. The sermon was listened to with deep attention and made a strong impression.

Another Man in Danger.

Shortly after 11 o'clock Saturday night as Sergt. Savage was doing his rounds, he was fortunate in discovering a young man named Knight, resident of Brazil's Field, lying in the drifts in McMurdo's Lane. Securing the assistance of other officers the man was quickly taken to the police station where he was given every attention, and soon revived. His clothing was taken off and put before the stove to dry and he was placed in the cells after he had a good heat. His hands and face were slightly frostbitten and by rubbing them with snow the police restored the circulation. Had not Sergt. Savage discovered the man he would have quickly smothered in the drifts.

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Feb. 12, 1912.
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Found in Drifts.

Shortly before midnight Saturday, when the blizzard raged with particular violence, Head Const. Peet while on his rounds found a man named Thomas Stamp, aged 65 years, lying in the drift in the West End, and had he been left a short while longer must have smothered. The man had taken some liquor and was making his way home when he fell and lay in the snow. The "Head" with the assistance of other men of the force brought the unfortunate to the police station, where his clothes, which were filled with snow, were taken off and put near the stove to dry while the guard and the other men wrapped him in blankets, and putting him opposite the stove, in which was a big fire, he gradually came round. The man was miserably clad to be out in such weather and the belief is that he had very little food during the day, as he is not in the best of circumstances. Yesterday he was feeling very unwell as the result of the exposure he suffered.

Sweeper Dam-ages Tram.

Saturday evening in the height of the blizzard as one of the street cars was turning into Holloway St. from Water Street, a sweeper coming over the latter thoroughfare crashed into the front of the tram and badly smashed it. Neither of the motormen saw the cars in which they were advance owing to the thick snow which fell, and when the cars came together both men narrowly escaped serious injury. The tram was badly smashed and will need considerable repairs.
