Up To Mr Brownrigg.

In his speech at the Squires endorsement meeting at the ago, Mr. Henry Brownrigg made "Opposition to the Reid Company's operation of the Railway," his chief topic, and upon the political past of Mr. Squires or Mr. Coaker or both combined. He has read the charges so definitely made on many occasions, about the receipt of monies by Mr. Squires from the Reids. He has read that Coaker stultified himself in 1918 by agreeing to increased passenger and freight rates. He has read that Mr. Coaker was a suppliant to the Messrs. Reid to endorse his note of hand.

Reading all these undenied and undeniable charges, what guarantee has been offered to satisfy Mr. Brownrigg that reform will spring from such a tainted source? Squires, Campbell and Brownrigg are anbell and Brownrigg are announced as the Liberal (?) Reform ticket for St. John's West, but most interest will be felt in the latter, his two colleagues having been in the public even having been in the public eye for some time. Mr. Brownrigg is a citizen of good reputation and a Municipal Councillor whose services have been satisfactory, and he is also of the type of man whom people like to have take an active part in public life. He has hitherto been a Liberal by political affilia-

Reform, it is quite proper to ask him what is the reform element of the party, what is the part of the policy he will support, and what guarantees of reform that party offers the country. What is the understanding—the plan of campaign—as Mr. Brownrigg knows it, between the Squires-Coaker faction, in opposition to the Government?

A few days ago Mr. Squires and Dr. . Campbell attended a meeting at the Advocate Office for a political conference, and the day before yesterday following the advent of Mr. Coaker to the city the same persons held another conference in the same office. All these men named have been bitter opponents of each other, and nothing but political necessity brings them together now. The persistently hostile attitude of Mr. Squires' papers, Star and Post, towards Coaker: the absolute silence or secret favor of the Advocate towards Squires, with the incidental agreement of these organs of Opposition about all and everything that they can say about the Government-all these things spring from a secret agreement. And that be. ing so we ask Mr. Brownrigg pointedly, and request an answer: Is he a Squires man, a Coaker man, or a Squires-Coaker man, and in either case how can he longer expect to be lassed as a Liberal?
