Raising Plan OF HON. DR. CAMPBELL, MINISTER

OF AGRICULTURE.

Hon. Dr. Campbell, Minister of Agriculture and Mines, arrived by the Sachem this morning after an extensive vacation in Canada where he has been incidentally purchasing prize stock for the new Model Farm, some four carloads of which arrived here a while ago. Dr. Campbell attended exhibitions and fairs in Charlottetown, Toronto, Guelph and in Quebec, where he purchased four carloads of purebred stock for the new farm, includand a carload of thoroughbred Cots wolds and Dorset-horned sheep. The latter breed twice a year, and are not afraid of dogs. Among the pigs are prize-winning Yorkshires, Berkshires and Tamsworths. One Jersey bull was purchased from Ball & Sons, of Brampton, famous breeders of Jer-seys. From Gordon Gooram, Ont., 10 registered cows and one registered Holstein bull were purchased. In Quebec Dr. Campbell purchased five Ayrshire cows and one bull from Ness & Co., amongst the number be-Ness & Co., amongst the number being a first prize 2-year-old winner at the Toronto Exhibition, and the 5th and 7th prize milch cows. A second and third prize, Pol Angus bulls, were purchased from Larkin Farm. These are beef animals. Three cows and 1 bull of milking Shorthorn breed were bought from Grove Farm, Ontario; two calves to these have been born since arrival here. In horse fiesh the two calves to these have been born since arrival here. In horse flesh the Minister has selected standard bred "Bert Axworthy," 1200 lbs., with a trotting record of 2.3½. A pure bred stallion, Dapple Bay, weighing about 1700 lbs., and a pair of 1st prize Percheon farm horses were also amongst the lot.
