Civic Commission Weekly Meeting.

The weekly meeting of the Municipal Council was held on Thursday evening at 8 o'clock. Mayor Gosling presided, and Councillors Morris, Ayre, Peat and Jackman were present. After the minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed, the following matters received attention:

A communication was read from the Prime Minister, stating the Municipal Charter had not, as yet, come down from the Legislative Council.

R. G. Ash, Secretary Nfld. Board of Fire Underwriters, asked for particulars regarding the acetylene compressing plant to be erected at the King's Wharf, and pointing out that, from an insurance standpoint, same would be considered a great hazard, and would probably affect the rating of buildings in vicinity. The Department of Marine and Fisheries informed the Council there is absolutely no danger to the city in the manufacturing of acetylene gas by the process to be used here, also that similar and larger plants are now in operation in the city of London. The Council, before giving permission, referred the matter to the Inspector-General, who saw no objection to permit being issued.

Inspector-General Hutchings wrote regarding hydrants near Belvedere Orphanage, which, he stated, were quite insufficient for fire protection. The Inspector-General's attention was called to this matter some time ago. The best supply, at present, in case of fire at the institution, would be from Newtown Road. Connections will be made with the Long Pond Road main, which will insure adequate water supply.

Communications were received from the Dominion Secretary of the Great War Veterans' Association and the Secretary Sergeants' Committee Royal Nfld. Regiment, regarding the erection of war memorial at Garrison Park, asking that site be changed and same erected at intersection of Bond Street and Garrison Hill. The request was acceded to, subject to the direction of the City Engineer.

Supt. of the Commercial Cable Co. drew attention to the lumber stored in the vacant lot adjacent to the premises, and asked if this was not contrary to the City Regulations. At the present time there are no City Regulations governing the storing of lumber, but the communication will be forwarded the Inspector-General.

A letter was received from J. A. Colbourne, 28 Gear Street, in reference to water and sewer extension. The matter will be attended to as soon as possible.

Mr. Alfred Rees wrote, asking compensation for damage to hay crop by pipe line. Council claims no responsibility in the matter.

Health Officer Brehm reported that occupants of two houses near the stream, Hamilton Avenue, have been depositing refuse in same, which is dangerous to the health of the children in the neighborhood. It was ordered the matter be referred to the Solicitor, and the owners of houses compelled to install sanitary appliances.

An application was read from Bandmaster Bulley of the C.C.C. for permission to hold concerts in the City Parks, under same conditions as last year. Arrangements will be made with the bandmasters of the City Brigades.

Requests of F. J. Cornick, Freshwater Road, and B. Dwyer, Carpasian Rd., with reference to drains in these localities, were referred to the Road Inspector for attention.

Albert Horwood, 66 Barter's Hill, applied for permission to install electric motor on his premises. The Engineer was instructed to investigate. The following plans were passed, subject to the approval of the City Engineer:—W. W. Whiteway (extension) corner Mackin and Leslie Sts.; M. J. Walsh (dwelling) Queen's Road; J. T. Dooley (dwelling) Patrick St.; J. W. Heale (dwelling) Forest Rd.; C. Gatehouse (dwelling) Freshwater Road; S. Taylor (dwelling) Warbury Street, provided he pays his proportion, according to frontage, for water and sewerage extension; Gen. Butterworth (extension) Beaumont St., provided water and sewerage are installed.

Permits for repairs were issued J. Kavanagh, York Street, and W. Chafe, Stewart Avenue.

Application of R. D. Cave, Pleasant St., for permission to bridge drain, was referred to the City Engineer for inquiry.

Reports of Health Officer, City Engineer, Plumbing Inspector, etc., were read; the payrolls and bills ordered paid; after which the meeting adjourned.

An Air Fight With Fokkers.

On June 18, 1916, while Second Lieutenant McCubbin, Royal Flying Corps, was up in the air for his usual daily patrol with his observer, a non-commissioned officer, they saw Lieutenant S. patrolling his adjoining beat, while far overhead three Fokkers were flying. Lieutenant McCubbin was some 8,000 feet up, and just as he saw the enemy machines, one of them dived and went down to earth, but the other two dropped like hawks after their prey on to his comrade's machine. Lieutenant S. also dived to avoid the first rush of the two attackers so that the actual fight took place at a height of about 5,500 feet; down at one sheer drop for 2,500 feet went McCubbin to join in, but too late to bring help, only retribution. As he dropped he saw Lieutenant S.'s machine get out of control, and then go plumb down to earth. Before Lieutenant S. had begun to steady himself from his victorious plunge, McCubbin was on him. He took no chance of firing from a safe distance, but went straight in, confident in his observer's nerve, and not until he was almost touching the enemy machine that the observer fired. At the first round the enemy was hit. The machine seemed suddenly to bank clean over on its right side, and then went down like a stone. The observer saw coming for McCubbin. The latter swerved and circled to get inside the enemy, but no shot was exchanged. McCubbin did not know that it was Immelman who was in the machine which has fallen. Doubtless the occupant of the

other Fokker, did, and knowing that Immelman was gone, either had not the heart or the nerve to continue his fight, so he dropped down after his lost comrade.
