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Mudania Agreement Signed By Allies and Turks.

Kemalists Secure Most of Their Demands
— French Influence Dominated Convention — Bluenose Will Defend International Fishermen's Trophy.

HARRINGTON'S WARNING.

LONDON, Oct. 10.

After numerous delays and interruptions the work of the Mudania conference reached a concluding point yesterday with the presentation of the final protocol.

The protocol, which was signed by all the Allies, which, as Mr. Harrington described it, would give to the Turks their aims within forty-five days. The Convention, consisting of fourteen clauses, drawn on liberal lines, showing traces of French influence on the side of the Kemalists. Under the terms of the agreement, the Greeks will evacuate Eastern Thrace within fifteen days, and the Allies will transfer to the Turks in an annual month. The Turkish civil administration will follow closely on the heels of the departing Greeks, the entire transfer being made under the supervision of the Allied Mission and Allied forces provisionally occupying Thrace not exceeding seven battalions. The number of Turkish gendarmes in the Province during the interval is left undefined and the discretion of the Kemalists, subject to Allied approval. The Turkish side guarantee not to place an army in Thrace until peace is ratified, while a new neutral zone will be delimited by a fixed commission. Mr. Pasha expressed the hope that the Government would approve the Convention and promised an answer by the end of the week. As the Government has instructed its agents to sign the Convention, if the Turkish sign, there appears good prospects of a peaceful settlement, ending to general peace. General Harrington in presenting the Convention to the House of Commons declared that Britain's last word and reminder to the Turks of the serious danger of making a conflict with British arms. To the Associated Press correspondent General Harrington said that the Convention was a step towards peace, but added that Great Britain is prepared for all eventualities. Should the Turks sign the Protocol there will remain the difficult question of the peace conference, and the question of whether the Allies and Black Sea States shall participate in it.

SIGNED.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 10.

The Mudania Convention has been signed, according to semi-official reports, here tonight.

ARMISTICE SIGNED.

MUDANIA, Oct. 10.

The Armistice Convention was signed here tonight at eleven o'clock. The representatives of all powers concerned affixed their signatures.

TURKS DISAPPOINTED.

MUDANIA, Oct. 10.

The Turkish Delegates were somewhat dismayed and disappointed over the turn of events of the past two days. The new attitude taken by France after the Paris Convention puzzled them and they were amazed that French friendship on which they had counted as their main prop in the negotiations did not yield the results expected. At the session on Monday night when Ismet Pasha expressed dissatisfaction at the terms the Allies offered, he said to General Harrington, "but your new Armistice Convention is in contradiction to the assurances given me by General Charpy. The Convention instead of paving the way for peace, only makes matters worse."

AN ELECTION BEFORE CHRISTMAS

LONDON, Oct. 10.

It is as certain as it can be that there will be a general election before Christmas, announced the political correspondent of Lloyd George's organ, the Daily Chronicle, following a meeting of the Cabinet at which the question discussed was the meeting of Parliament in November.

LEOYD GEORGE WILL FIGHT.

LONDON, Oct. 10.

Premier Lloyd George has clearly no intention of resigning office at the orders of his numerous newspaper critics. On the contrary he is determined to fight them, and at Manchester on Saturday is expected to make a vigorous reply to his critics and defend the Near East policy. Should there be a new crisis in the Near East it may of course entail a change in his plans.

HORNE POSTPONES TRIP.

LONDON, Oct. 10.

Sir Robert Stevenson Horne, Chancellor of the Exchequer, has indefinitely postponed his debt refunding mission to the United States, according to the Daily Express. The action is in consequence of the political situation in England.

BLUENOSE WILL COMPETE.

HALIFAX, Oct. 10.

The Lunenburg fishing schooner, Bluenose, last year's International Champion, will represent Canada in the International Races off Gloucester on Oct. 21 and 22. It was announced following a meeting here this evening of the Nova Scotia Race Committee and the Captains of the vessels entered in the Nova Scotia Championship series.

The meeting was held following the second unsuccessful attempt to-day to sail the second of the Nova Scotia championship races. On agreement of the Captains of the four entries it was decided to award the prizes on the standing of the vessels in the first race on Saturday—first, Bluenose; second, Canadia; third, Mahaska; fourth, Margaret K. Smith.

MARTIAL LAW IN ATHENS.

ATHENS, Oct. 10.

Martial law was proclaimed in Athens tonight. This action was taken to prevent the hot-heads in the army from opposing the Government's decision in accepting the loss of Eastern Thrace.

RACE AGAIN CALLED OFF.

HALIFAX, Oct. 10.

To-day's race was called off at two o'clock when it was obvious that the boats could not cover the course in the time limit. The Canadia was leading, Bluenose second, Mahaska third, and Smith last. The Bluenose was forced to make a fresh start after beating the gun across the line.

UNKNOWN STEAMER SINKS.

NORTH SYDNEY, Oct. 10.

A two masted steamer with funnel amidships, apparently a coal boat heading into the Gulf of St. Lawrence sank two miles off the shore at Bay St. Lawrence during heavy weather, on Thursday afternoon. The Dominion Coal Company, and the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company, said all their boats were accounted for.

HIERARCHY PRONOUNCES AGAINST DUBLIN.

DUBLIN, Oct. 10.

A definite pronouncement against the anti-Treaty rebellion was made to-day by the Irish Hierarchy and it is expected to have an important influence on the situation. The Hierarchy issued a pastoral letter condemning in the strongest terms the guerrilla warfare against the Free State Government, declaring "the killing of National soldiers is murder before God," and denouncing robberies and destruction to roads and railways. The letter enjoins the persons guilty of such crimes shall not be given absolution or admitted to Communion if they persist.

S.S. Meigle en route for Labrador again arrived in port Saturday afternoon and left after a few hours stay.

Schooner Roy Bruce, Capt. Hollett, which brought a load of coal to Megers, R. D. McRae & Sons, finished discharging on Thursday and left port the next morning for Sydney.

The funeral of the late Mr. Stephen Hunt, whose death occurred on Wednesday, took place Friday afternoon. Interment was made in the Church of England Cemetery. Rev. W. E. R. Cracknell officiating. He is survived by a wife and two daughters; Mary, (Mrs. H. Keeler of Canada) and Susie, (Mrs. E. George of Dildo) and two sons, John and Mark, both of Montreal.
