Dr. Egbert who for two years was member of the Calgary General hospital board, being one of the city's representatives during that period, is advocating the building of a municipal hospital. For two years while Dr. Egbert sat on the council he was always favoring a city owned and controled hospital, and is still of the opinion such an institution should be built. In an interview with the Albertan last night the Doctor was of the opinion that a good hispital could be built for \$200,000 and that the hospital should be managed by a board elected by the people similar to the way the public schools are manag-

He said "In the first place I think that if the city's money is to be spent in the maintainance of a hospital, it in the maintainance of a hospital, it should be spent by those who are responsible to the people, and not by a corporation which is in no way responsible. A few years ago the Calgary General hospital board applied to the city for a sum of \$165.000 with which to build a hospital. The city voted that amount of money (many people believing at the time it was for a munifipal hospital) under promise from the hospital board that a first mortgage would be given on the hospital as security to the city. This mortgage was described by the money, but after it has been spent.


