London, Feb. 5. — The Pietermar-itzburg correspondent of the Daily Mail, telegraphing yesterday, says: "General Buller has undoubtedly secured the road to Ladysmith and should reach his objective this week. It is believed that the object of the Boers in occupying Ngutu, Zululand, is to secure the road from Dundee to Vryheid in case of retreat.

Joubert Re ired from the Field.

"I learn from a reliable source that Gen. Joubert was seriously in-jured by a shell in the fight at Wil-low Grange, and that he will never be able to command again on horse-back. My informant says that he has in fact retired from the field. "The Boers admit that the attack
