



St. George's Anniversary Celebrated by a Banquet.

Good Speeches - The Toast List-English, Scotch and Irish Mingle Together.

The 28th anniversary of St. George's Society was celebrated last night as many a previous anniversary has been -with a big banquet and a good time. The jubilee was held in the Tecumseh House, and lasted until after midnight, when about 150 stalwart sons of St. George, St. Andrew and St. Patrick parted after spending a most delightful evening together. The gathering numbered fully 150, and while there was a large majority of the sons of St. George, yet St. Patrick and St. Andrew were well represented. The speeches were of the usual patriotic nature and very good. The band of the Seventin Fusiliers was present, and throughout the evening rendered excellent music. The president, Mr. G. N. Sayers, sat at the head of the table. On his right sat the head of the table. On his right sat Mr. R. K. Cowan, president of St. Andrew's Society; Mr. J. L. Fitzgerald, first vice-president, Irish Benevolent Society; Mr. W. H. Jacks, United States consul. On his left were Dean Innes, Mr. J. B. Cox, secretary St. George's; Justice Rose, Mr. W. H. Bartram, Major Beattie, Lieut.-Col Lindsay, Ald. Wm. Skinner, Ald. Ed. Weld, Mr. B. J. Nash, Mr. R. M. C. Toothe and Ald. Pritchard. That day, however, was past, and England, with her love of liberty, had gained the supremacy of the world. Mr. Webb expressed pleasure at being able to again attend another of St. George's banquets in health and strength.
