KILLED HER LITTLE SISTER.

Terrible Tragedy Oused by a Child Being Sent to Chop Wood.

New York, Sept. 9.—Three-year-old Maggie McGowan was killed by her 8-year-old sister Kate, Thursday, with an axe. The children, daughters of Wm. McGowan 775 West Twenty-first place were in the yard of their home, when the tragedy took place. Kate was attempting to chop wood with a heavy axe, and little Maggie was watching her and was much interested. She leaned too far forward when the axe was lifted, and when it came down it struck her.

Mrs. McGowan, the mother, was busy at the time, and while she knew what Kate was doing, paid little attention to the girl, thinking Maggie would be all right. The child, however, was so anxious to see all that was being done, that she kept creeping closer to her sister. Kate did not notice how near the baby was to her, and raised the axe as high as she could. As she did so, Maggie threw her head forward, and the axe struck her just above the forehead, and almost in the center.

The child fell without a cry, but Kate screamed wildly for her mother who rushed to the spot and picked up her baby, trying to stop the flow of blood. The mother carried the child indoors and neighbors were for a doctor. Before he came the girl was dead.

An inquest was held in the evening and the jury, after hearing Kate tell how the affair happened, rendered a verdict of accidental death.
