WESTERN ONTARIO.

A Michigan Central Train Runs
112 Miles in 113 Minutes.

The Rondeau Point Purchased by
Capitalists.

Real Estate Transfers—Several Accidents
Reported—\$600 Worth of Books
Seized by the Windsor Customs
Anthony.

During noon hour at St. George school a
day or two ago, two or three boys were
scuffling and wrestling, when Willie Law-
rence was thrown to the ground, another
boy falling on him. Willie was so unfor-
tunate as to have his shoulder-blade broken
by the fall.

Cathcart's civic holiday was held on
Friday.

A peculiar accident occurred Thursday
on the road leading to St. George station.
As Fred Green was driving up the hill with
a load of grain, the horses, stopping to
rest, were unable to hold the load and were
dragged backward, wagon, load and horses
going over a twenty-foot embankment and
down against the fence. Strange to relate
a broken wagon tongue was the only dam-
age sustained.

ELGIN.

The Sheddin Mechanics' Institute has
received the Government grant, amounting
to \$113 75.

While a load of delegates of the Chris-
tian Endeavor Society of Aylmer, consist-
ing of Miss Minnie Martin, Misses Etta
and Minnie Cogger, Frank Tibbets and
Fred McConnell were returning from St.
Thomas the other night and when near
the railway crossing the horses
became frightened at a train and
shied to one side, upsetting the rig
into the ditch and throwing the occupants
out. They were badly shaken up. Miss
Cogger had her wrist badly sprained,
while Mr. Tibbets was badly bruised
about the face. The horses were caught
after running about a mile. The rig was
badly smashed.

A special train on the Michigan Central
recently made the run from Windsor to
St. Thomas, 112 miles, in 113 minutes,
including two stops.

Walter Currie, the vagrant boy, 10 years
of age, who pleaded guilty at St. Thomas
to stealing a toy engine, was found guilty
of stealing chickens from Mrs. Myers, of
Fingal, and sentenced to five years in the
Reformatory at Penitentiary.

Charles H. Brown, Rodney, was arrested
the other night on a warrant, charging him
with embezzlement. Brown is manager of
a saw mill at Rodney for the complainant,
Mrs. Annie Fletcher, and it is charged by
her that he, on Sept. 19, feloniously em-
bezzled 3,015 feet of chestnut lumber, and
on Sept. 23 embezzled 3,000 feet of chest-
nut lumber. She charges that he sold the
lumber and retained the proceeds to his
own use. The hearing was fixed for Tues-
day next. Mr. Brown was admitted to
bail in \$400. Friends of Mr. Brown claim
that he will be able to successfully refute
the charges brought against him.

Snuck thieves stole a beef cow from W.
Secord's field the other night at Orwell.
They also turned five cattle on the G. T. R.,
four of which were killed.

John Whaley, Union, threshed 300
bushels of oats at Mr. T. Jackson's South-

wold, Friday morning, in an hour and a
half. The time is said to be remarkably
fast.

The recent harvest home tea meeting at
Iona under the auspices of the Methodist
Ladies' Aid was very successful. The choir
and quartet music was well rendered by
the Fingal Methodist choir. Addresses
were given by Rev. Messrs. McAllister,
B.A.; Garis, of the Congregational Church;
W. Burgess, Sheldon; T. C. Scott, B.A.;
Dutton; Elder Wilson, of the Baptist
Church, and J. B. Phillips, St. Thomas.
The munificent returns will enable the
trustees to liquidate the entire parsonage
debt.

R. Watson, Belmont, has sold his farm,
east half of lot No. 23, in con. 7 of South
Dorchester, to Mr. Michael, of Minnesota,
for \$7,600.

The dredge Ontario has completed her
contract at Port Stanley for this season,
and is preparing to return to Amherstburg,
where she will finish dredging, which was
under way when she received orders to
proceed to Port Stanley. A greater depth
of water in the Port Stanley harbor now
than has been for many years, as thirteen
feet may be relied upon.

A large raft of pine timber which went
to pieces east of the Rondeau Point about
two weeks ago has been scattered all over
the shores of Lake Erie. Seven thousand
logs have been harbored at Erie, Pa. Capt.
Ellison, of Port Stanley, has been busily
engaged in the same work with the steamer
Joe Milton, and has secured a large num-
ber. The owner of the timber arrived at
Port Stanley Thursday.

J. B. Davidson and J. A. Harvey attend-
ed the court of revision of the voters' list
at Fingal on Friday. There were 92 ap-
peals, 34 of which were allowed, a number
dismissed and a number laid over for a
week for consideration.

D. E. Holmes, cheese-maker, late of
Bayham, died Friday morning at the resi-
dence of his brother-in-law, Howard Burn-
ham, St. Thomas, from the effects of
cancer of the stomach, aged 32 years. He
leaves a wife and three children. He had
been a resident of Bayham for years, only
going to St. Thomas a short time ago.

Minor Barnes, one of the oldest and best-
known residents of St. Thomas, passed
away Thursday evening at the ripe age of
81 years.

Over 50 members of Aylmer Tent, No. 9,
Knights of Maccabees, met at the Mansion
House in that town Thursday evening,
where a supper was given. An enjoyable
time was spent.

Wm. McGregor, M.P., was well enough
to go out for a drive Thursday.

Some time ago the customs authorities of
Windsor seized about \$600 worth of books
from F. B. Dickerson, of Detroit, claiming
that they were entered under their value.
They are held in the custom house await-
ing the decision of the Government in the
matter.

HURON.

Reeve Hanna, of Wingham, has pur-
chased the building in that town known as
St. Paul's Church and the property in con-
nection therewith, paying for it the sum of
\$704. Mr. Hanna intends pulling down
the church and erecting cottages in its
place.

John Johnston's house at Rodgerville
was burned to the ground the other morn-
ing. It caught fire during the night by
some means unknown, and it was a narrow
escape for Mr. Johnston and his family.
Some of the household effects were saved,
while it was with difficulty that the hired
man was gotten out of the burning build-
ing. Mr. Johnston's loss will be heavy, as
he carried but light insurance.

The wedding of Dr. J. R. Shannon, one

of Goderich's most popular townsmen, to
Aggie, youngest daughter of Hon. A. M.
Ross, created unusual interest in that town
Wednesday. They were married at St.
George's Church by the rector, Rev. Mr.
Young. The church was crowded. The
bride was handsomely dressed in white
silk, tulle veil and orange blossoms. The
bridesmaids, the Misses Cameron, Hamil-
ton, and McLoughlin, wore cream crepon
dresses and leghorn hats. Miss Gretchen
Myers, niece of the bride, the maid of
honor, was dressed in white. Dr. Ross,
brother of the bride, acted as groomsmen.
The full choir attended and sang "The
Voice That Breathed Our Eden" and other
music. Among many and valuable presents
was a deed from the bride's parents of the
family residence here and an oak-cased up-
right piano from the groom's father, Dr. G.
C. Shannon. The happy couple left for the
east by the 2 o'clock train in a shower of
rice and good wishes.

KENT.

Mrs. Brookhanks, of Chatham township,
has been thrown out of a buggy and seri-
ously injured.

It is understood that the Ontario part of
the Rondeau Point is about to be sold to
a syndicate of wealthy capitalists for the
purpose of converting it into a summer re-
sort. They will build upon it immedi-
ately a commodious hotel, and a spur of
the Walkerville Railway will connect it
with Ridgeway. The price is about
\$20,000.

MIDDLESEX.

At the last meeting of the London Town-
ship Council bylaw No. 333, authorizing
the borrowing of a sum not to exceed
\$6,000 for schools and current expendi-
ture, was passed. The road and bridge
appropriation of St. George's ward was in-
creased by \$200 and those of the other four
wards by \$50 each.

George Hunter, of the township of Caradoc,
has sold out there, and purchased
Henry Hunter's farm, in the township of
Dorchester, part of lot 12, con. 3, north of
the River Thames. It is his intention to
permanently remain in Dorchester, the
home of his youth.

The Methodist Church at Glencoe is pro-
gressing rapidly and is ready for elating.
The state is expected daily.

Thomas Tremble, Dorchester Station,
lacerated his foot badly a day or two ago
while working with the Tracey Bros., of
St. Marys.

Angus Graham, Glencoe, was successful
in securing the natural science scholarship,
valued at \$250, at the late supplementary
examination at McGill University.

James Watson, of Hamilton, manu-
facturer; Ernest Plummer Watson, Strathroy,
manufacturer; Rupert Macdonald Watson,
Hamilton, agent; Charles Summer Scott,
accountant, and William Barclay McMur-
rich, Toronto, have applied for a charter
for the Watson Manufacturing Company, of
St. Catharines, with a capital of \$30,000,
divided into 1,200 shares of \$25 each. The
company will manufacture woolen and cot-
ton goods. This means that the business of
the Strathroy Knitting Company, which
was burned out, will be removed to St.
Catharines, to be conducted on a smaller
scale.

intelligence that his brother, Alfred Lee,
