To Decentralize the Courts.

Mr. Matthew Wilson, Q.C., of Chatham, Interviewed Sir John Thompson at Ottawa, on behalf of the bar of Western Ontario, to ask for the co-operation of the Federal authorities with the Provincial Government and Legislature, with the view of bringing about the decentralization of the Ontario courts. Mr. Wilson pointed out that the location of a high court judge at each of the large cities in the Province would promote public convenience and reduce the cost of litigation. The judges residing elsewhere than in Toronto could go to that city and sit in divisional courts, and would thus be kept in touch with each other. There was no reason why Judge Armour, for instance, who resides in Cobourg, should have to go to Toronto to hear and dispose of legal matters arising in Cobourg, as he is obliged to do now. 
