Mr. John Beattie, county clerk of Wellington, a private banker at Fergus, is dead.

The Furness Line steamer Halifax City has arrived at Halifax 23 days overdue from London.

Col. John Churchill, owner of the celebrated Kentucky, aged 78, is dead at Louisville, Ky., April 7.

Two cases supposed to be leprosy are under the supervision of the Winnipeg Health Department. Both are from Chicago.

The city of Chicago has just allowed its schools the sum of \$15,579,116 for the coming year. This is an increase of \$661,000 over the appropriation of last year.

Wm. Geldart, picture framer, who has done business at 209 King street west, Toronto, for many years, died suddenly Sunday morning of heart disease. He was 67 years of age and a widower. He leaves a son and a daughter.

HEROIC MEASURES

Must Be Taken to Save the Sea Seal Herd.

San Francisco, March 22.—Prof. David Starr Jordan, the head of the commission appointed by the United States to investigate the fur seal industry, has returned to this city from Washington. He says the new administration is taking steps for the final settlement of the fur seal question. The only way, he says, to preserve the seal herd is totally to prohibit pelagic sealing. Great Britain has refused to accept the United States' plan, but if that Government declines the United States will take aggressive measures against the female seal at the rookeries will be branded and the value of their skins destroyed, so that there will be no temptation for sealers to kill them.

Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Flannery, who is very familiar with the whole seal question, has been requested to remain in office until April and give his advice to the negotiations with Great Britain.

LONDON, March 22.—A dispatch from Athens to the Times says that Crown Prince Constantine, at the head of 4,700 troops, has started for the frontier. The scene of his departure was one of the wildest enthusiasm. Cries of "Hurrah for Macedonia!" rose from every throat as the troops passed along.

FIGHTING ON THE FRONTIER.

Paris, March 22.—A dispatch from Belgrade, Serbia, to the Ecclai says it is reported that a sanguinary conflict has broken out between the Greeks and the Turks in the Thessaly frontier. This battle has been looked upon by some of the Greek forces as the beginning of a new era on the frontier, while the Turkish forces are said to have numbered many thousands of men, who have been expected to attack the Greeks for several years.

TROUBLE ELSEWHERE.

It is officially reported at Constantinople that there has been serious trouble at Tokat, 58 miles northwest of Sivas, in Asia Minor. Beyond stating that fifteen Armenians and three Mussulmans were killed, no details of the affair are given.

THE SCAUTER HIGHLANDERS EN

ROUTE FOR CRETE.

A Blockade of the Island May Prove

Useless.

Difficulty Experienced in Feeding

Turkish Troops on the Frontier.

The Fighting at Tokat—

Servia for Peace.

Valletta, Island of Malta, March 22.—The Scouter Highlanders have sailed for Canea, Island of Crete, on board the transport, Olybe. They will arrive at their destination on Wednesday.

Constantinople, March 22.—The opinion prevails here that the blockade of the Island of Crete by the fleets of the foreign powers, which commenced yesterday, will be a useless proceeding, as Col. Vassos, commander of the Greek army of occupation, is well supplied with provisions. It is now thought that the best means to accomplish the withdrawal of the Greek troops from Crete would be to withdraw the Turkish troops.

Difficulty is already being experienced in feeding the Turkish troops in the frontier. Edmond Pasha, the Turkish commander in Macedonia, has telegraphed the Minister of War not to send any further reinforcements of troops, on account of the scarcity of provisions. It is further stated that the Turkish army has twice submitted its resignation to the Porte, but it is added, the Ministers refused to accept it.

The commander of the Turkish squadron just made ready for sea has been ordered to leave the Gulf of Gallipoli. Their departure from here was intended to justify the withdrawal of the Turkish fleet from the Gulf of Gallipoli and to inspire the Mussulmans with confidence.

During the disorders at Tokat, in the Sivas district, of Asia Minor, reported yesterday, fifteen persons were killed and 50 wounded. The Turks attacked the Armenians while the latter were in church, and it is feared that this outbreak marks a renewal of the massacres of Armenians.
