

The City Council.

Aldermen Adjourn Until After the Elections.

Last Night's Meeting Was Breezy and Interesting.

No Very Great Questions Came Before the Board.

But There Was Much to Say on Small Ones.

The Court of Revision and Dollar Members—A Sinking Fund That Failed—Band Concert Disputes—Council Miscellany.

When the mayor said that there would be no more late meetings of the council this year, he reckoned without the aldermen. Last night's meeting lasted until 11 o'clock, and a considerable amount of business was transacted. There was just enough of ward feeling abroad in the meeting to make the debates spicy and a little sharp at times, but everything was finally made unalloyed after the election. Ald. Powell was in his accustomed seat again, and Ald. Carrothers was the only absentee.

RE DROP-LETTER POSTAGE.
John Blevins, city clerk of Toronto, wrote asking the co-operation of the council of the city in securing a reduction of the rate of postage on drop letters. The 2-cent rate was referred to as exorbitant and should not be tolerated any longer. In Toronto they had appointed two members of the council to interview candidates for Dominion Parliamentary honors with a view to securing their assistance in Parliament in the event of their election. No. 1 committee.

OFFICIALLY SUSTAINED.
The Board of Health forwarded an official report sustaining Dr. Hutchinson in regard to the charges of milkmen. The pertinent clause read: "That the board is of the opinion that the charges affecting the integrity and honesty of the medical health officer are not proven, but that certain changes may be made in the system of inspection adopted by Dr. Hutchinson, which will lead to greater efficiency and tend to satisfy the milk vendors that perfect justice is done to all parties."

ELECTION CLOSE AT HAND.
The first ripple of the election breeze fluttered through the chamber when Franklin Wright, returning officer, wrote asking for the use of the City Hall on June 16 from noon until 2 p.m. for the purpose of receiving nominations. If a ballot was demanded he would also require 26 ballot boxes and screens. The election will take place on June 23, and Mr. Wright will make his official count on June 27.

MISCELLANY.
Walter Richards, on behalf of the Robin Hood Drill Corps, was given the use of the agricultural hall for an ice cream social on June 11.
Evelyn Johnston, secretary of the London Teachers' Association, applied for the grant of \$25 to which they are entitled under the statutes. No. 1.
James Brady, re taxes on property, corner of William and Pall Mall street.
No. 2.
A. E. Westman applied on behalf of the Musical Society Band for the \$500 grant in return for band concerts. No. 2.
M. J. Kent complained of the condition of the sewer through the Kent estate. Mary Laing applied for a concrete walk on parts of Talbot and Carling streets. Referred to No. 2 committee.

DRINKING FOUNTAINS.
The first discussion arose over a proposition to remove, at the request of the managers, the drinking fountain from in front of Knox Church. No. 3 committee recommended that it be placed at Wortley road and Health street. This gave rise to several dry jokes, one of which Ald. Pritchard resented at length, and protested against very vehemently. He did so because Ald. Armstrong suggested that a certain location for the fountain would be handy for the farmers going to St. Thomas, to which place Ald. Pritchard always asserts the electric cars are driving them.

The clause was adopted.
THE ARMY AND THE PARK.
A. R. Savage, of the Salvation Army, wrote about the objection of the council to the use of the drum in the park on Sunday afternoon. "We have," said he, "been in the habit of using it frequently during our afternoon meetings, but as we do not wish to be an annoyance to the contrary, a blessing—we shall be happy to arrange to use the drum only when the band plays, which would not mean more than two

or three times during the afternoon, besides the street parade."
The mayor said that a person with a sick child was the chief objector last year.
Ald. O'Meara thought the letter was quite satisfactory.
Ald. Pritchard, while acknowledging that it would not be popular for him to do so, advocated keeping the army out of the park, mainly so that the grass could be kept green.
Ald. Wm. Heaman said there had been no complaints on that score before, and pointed out that the army conducted their exercises on the gravel.
Ald. Taylor and Ald. Pritchard had a side argument as to how things were conducted at Hyde Park, London, England, and in the end the army secured the permission coveted.

STREET WANTED.
No. 2 committee recommended that the petition of W. M. Seaborn, et al., asking that a street be opened between Quebec and Charlotte streets, be filed.

Ald. Dreaney moved in amendment that Lorne avenue be opened. Ald. Pritchard seconded.
It would cost \$350 to grade and gravel the block, and there was a long dispute as to where the money was to come from.

Then Ald. Dreaney, in disgust, said he would withdraw his motion.
But Ald. Pritchard would not let him. He told the aldermen there was no use blinking matters or laughing them out of court. If they did not open the street and allow trade to come into the city, trade would go to the devil.
Several modes of raising the money were proposed, none of which were satisfactory, and the matter was finally, on motion of Ald. Parnell, referred back to No. 2 committee with power.

TO READ, OR NOT TO READ.
There was something of a struggle just as the reading of No. 1 committee's report was commenced. It is customary to read all the accounts and amounts paid. This naturally takes considerable time, as the list is never small. When Ald. Armstrong began to read, Ald. Garratt promptly moved that the accounts be taken as read.

"You might just as well," said Ald. Armstrong, "they are all paid."
The aldermen seemed satisfied to let the matter go without a vote. Ald. Parnell demurred, and Ald. Dreaney said: "Read 'em, read 'em." Ald. Armstrong was going on to read the second clause of the report, when the mayor insisted on a vote being taken, saying it was an important matter.

The council decided to have the accounts read, but Ald. Pritchard insisted on the yeas and nays being recorded, even if some of the aldermen did "fink." The division was 10-4, and the accounts were read. They amounted to \$3,139.48. No fault was found with any of them, but the aldermen felt more satisfied because they were read. The balance of the report went through without comment.

ALD. DREANEY'S STANDING QUERIES.

Ald. Dreaney never allows the order of inquiries to pass without making some inquiry about the G. T. R. shops. The mayor had no sooner announced the order, when Ald. Dreaney said: "How about the car shops, your worship?"
The Mayor—All right.
Ald. Dreaney—Anything new?
The Mayor's reply sounded something like, "I'll see you afterwards."

FIRE HALL VETS.
Ald. Pritchard—Why have Dr. Wilson's services been suspended, and why has the veterinary engaged to look after the welfare of the horses at the fire hall?

Ald. John Heaman (chairman of the fire and light committee)—I believe Dr. Wilson has part of the work, and Mr. Tennant another part. Those are the instructions I gave the chief of the department.

RENUMBERING HOUSES.
Ald. McCallum—About a year ago an order was passed to have the houses in No. 6 ward properly numbered. When will that be done?
Ald. Parnell—It is the intention of No. 2 committee to take the matter up shortly.

Ald. Nutkins—It would be well for No. 2 committee to take up the question of renumbering the whole of the city.

SHOULD READ THE "ADVERTISER."
Ald. Skinner—I understand the G. T. R. magnates will be here tomorrow. Has anything been done to have the council wait on them in relation to the car shops?

Mayor Little—They promised to let me know when they were coming, but they have not as yet.
Ald. Skinner—I heard this afternoon that they were coming tomorrow.

The Mayor—I believe the party has gone to the coast, and may not be here for a couple of weeks.

STREET RAILWAY EXTENSION.
Ald. Dreaney made still another inquiry about the street railway extension east on Dundas street. He wanted to know when the line would be extended. He said that the commission, to which place Ald. Pritchard always asserts the electric cars are driving them.

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PROPOSED SINKING FUND.
Ald. Taylor pressed his notice of motion to set apart \$7,500 of the street appropriation until later in the season, in order to meet contingencies. He said this had always been customary, but when he asked that each ward be cut down in order to make up the amount, he was greeted with a general "tut, tut," around the board.

Passing on, Ald. Taylor once more pitched into No. 6 ward, asking that in view of the large amount of money to be spent in that ward \$2,000 be deducted there, and the balance from the rest of the city.

Ald. Pritchard followed Ald. Taylor, but was even a little more caustic in his references to No. 6 ward.
All this, of course, had a soothing effect on the nerves of Ald. Parnell. His equanimity was considerably disturbed, and when he arose he promptly accused Ald. Pritchard of voting one way in committee, and another way in council, and of not knowing at times what he really was voting on.

This brought Ald. Pritchard to his feet with another vehement protest, and the mayor, looking in Ald. Parnell's direction, called for order.
Ald. Pritchard—Yes, you came to order, but you won't call other people to order.

The Mayor—Now, Ald. Pritchard, be reasonable. Was I calling you to order? (Laughter.)
Ald. Parnell continued, warmly defending his ward, and stating that the appropriation was made with the unanimous consent of No. 2 committee. Ald. Pritchard—I deny that.

Ald. Parnell—Notwithstanding the

denial of one of the gentlemen who has shown conclusively here tonight that he does not know what he is voting on.
Ald. Pritchard—I protest against such a slur as that.
The Mayor—Order.
Ald. Pritchard—Well, I will not put up with it. I am quite capable of knowing what I do in No. 8 committee as Ald. Parnell is.

Ald. Taylor—Yes, all right.
Ald. Pritchard—I am not all right. I will not have such slurs thrown out, and the mayor is backing him up in it. This Mayor (with resignation)—I never get angry.

Ald. Parnell—No. 6 ward came into the city of London with the unanimous consent of the citizens of London.
Ald. Taylor—Oh, no.
Ald. Parnell—Mr. Mayor, am I going to be heard or not? I say yes, and I think it is unfair of Ald. Taylor to be slinging dirt at the ward that I represent.

Ald. Pritchard—There is enough dirt over there now, without it.
Finally Ald. Parnell requested the council not to carry the resolution.
Ald. O'Meara—I hope the council will not carry any such resolution. Every year No. 2 committee is set upon or some objection made to their expenditure. I believe there is no more economical committee in the council than No. 2 committee.

Ald. Cooper—I hope the aldermen won't be for it.
Ald. Taylor—You don't understand the question at all.
Ald. Cooper insisted that he did, and the other aldermen shouted "question."

Ald. Powell—The council have given me a holiday. I thank them for it.
Ald. Armstrong—Have you sent in your bill yet?
The Mayor—Let us get on, please.

Ald. Powell—It is unwise under present circumstances to draw lines between No. 2 and No. 1 wards, unless we go right back to the old days of the past, and introduce that most iniquitous thing—ward appropriation.

Ald. Taylor—What is it today?
Ald. Skinner thought that the council wisely and judiciously granted the amount to No. 6 ward because it was needed. But he thought, however, that a sinking fund should be provided by the committee for contingencies.

On the division into Ald. Taylor, Pritchard and Skinner voted yeas.
Ald. Taylor called for the yeas and nays, and also wanted the yeas and nays of Ald. Powell and Douglass, who objected to voting, recorded.

The mayor ruled that the council could not force a motion to vote, and could not record the names unless by consent.
Ald. Pritchard made a remark of some kind with any of them, but the aldermen felt more satisfied because they were read. The balance of the report went through without comment.

Ald. Pritchard—No, sir; I did not.
The Mayor—Well, what is the use of wrangling?
Ald. Pritchard—All I said was that you ruled, and I am satisfied.

The Mayor—Oh, well; I beg your pardon.
Finally the mayor smoothed out matters by asking Ald. Powell and Ald. Douglass to consent to be recorded. Ald. Powell said he would do so, but would not vote for a "silly" resolution.

As the next business was called, the mayor gave this parting advice: "Don't touch this ward business. It raises a row every time."

TAXING WHEEL LENDERS.
Ald. Dreaney pressed his notice of motion to have bicycle dealers pay a fee of \$25 if they wish to keep wheels for hire. He said he did so to protect himself.

Ald. Armstrong proposed that the matter should go to No. 3 committee. Ald. Garratt seconded, and the proposal carried.

WHEELMEN AND SIDEWALKS.
When it came to be Ald. Armstrong's turn to press his motion to amend the city bylaws so as to permit wheelmen to ride on the sidewalk from 11 p.m. to 1 a.m.
"How it comes to be my resolution I hardly know," explained Ald. Armstrong, "I understood it was Ald. Cooper's."

Ald. Cooper spoke at length to the motion urging that such a provision would be of immense benefit to doctors, newspaper men and early morning workmen. He said it was no laughing matter.

Ald. Parnell—I am bound to say that a more childish resolution I never heard in all my life.
Ald. Cooper—Well, you are the child, then.

Ald. Powell—I hope I am—childlike and bland.
Ald. Garratt—They talk about doctors, I believe, on the sidewalks. I would like to ask if midwives are to be included? (Laughter.)

The division was laughable. Ald. Cooper's anxiety to have the motion pass being fearfully evident. "Vote," he urged, as the members were in disposition to strike. "Tell them what it is," he urged of the mayor.

The mayor explained the question, and as Ald. Nutkins' vote was recorded, he crooked his finger at Ald. Cooper and remarked that he had him for voting for his drinking fountain.

The division, which Ald. Cooper particularly requested the press to publish, was as follows:
Yeas—Wm. Heaman, Cooper, Armstrong, and Parnell—4.
Nays—Ald. Parnell, Douglass, Skinner, Garratt, Dreaney, Bennett, Nutkins, McCallum and Geary—12.

THE TAX PINE.
Ald. O'Meara moved to remodel one item of the estimates in order to provide for a 5 cent fine on tax delinquents.
The aldermen immediately asked where the money to do so was to come from.
Ald. O'Meara, Douglass, Cooper, Dreaney, and Taylor voted yeas and the motion was lost.

MINOR MATTERS.
Ald. Pritchard gave notice of motion to re-engage Dr. Wilson as veterinary for the fire department horses.
Ald. Wm. Heaman moved, seconded by Ald. Skinner, that Mr. Wm. Reid be refunded the amount paid for his sewer. Mr. Reid to remedy the matter at his own expense.

Referred to No. 1 committee.
Ald. Skinner gave notice of motion to abate the smoke nuisance.

BAND CONCERTS.
Ald. Bennett was sorry that the committee having the matter of band concerts in hand were not ready report, but so that the concert might begin, he moved that the grant be divided between the Musical Society Band and the Severn.

The Mayor—The matter can only be dealt with in this way by consent.
Ald. Parnell—The money is really in the hands of the committee to expend. Is that not so, Mr. Clerk?

Mr. Kingston—I don't think so.
Ald. Parnell—Well, give your reason.
The Mayor—I hope the clerk won't. The council will only get into a wrangle.

gle. Give No. 2 committee power to have a couple of concerts during the next few weeks.
Ald. O'Meara moved that each band be given a concert, but there was a difference of opinion between Ald. Parnell and Ald. Douglass as to whether every member of each band should be engaged. Ald. Douglass felt they should, and as he would not consent otherwise the matter dropped.

DEBENTURES FOR SALE.
A bylaw empowering the treasurer to borrow \$60,000 from the Bank of Montreal with which to meet current expenses was passed. The waterworks debenture bylaw also passed, and the mayor and treasurer were authorized to sell the lot (\$20,000) at not less a price than was received for the last debentures sold.

COURT OF REVISION.
The construction of the Court of Revision in accordance with the new act was entered upon. The council must appoint one member, the mayor another, while the sheriff is an ex-officio member. The salary limit is \$300.

Ald. Armstrong proposed ex-Mayor Cowan. No second.
Ald. Wm. Heaman proposed Wm. Bowman. Ald. Parnell seconded.
Ald. Garratt proposed James Cousins. Ald. Pritchard seconded. Lost.

Ald. Dreaney proposed ex-Mayor Andrew McCormick. Ald. Skinner seconded. Lost.
Ald. Parnell then declared the new law to be most iniquitous, in that it took all the power out of municipal bodies.

Ald. Bennett proposed ex-Ald. Jones. Ald. Garratt seconded. Carried.
Ald. Parnell moved that the salary be \$1 per annum.
Ald. Taylor—I suppose you have Mr. Jones' consent to act.

Ald. Parnell—I can't say that I have.
Ald. Skinner—He will be willing to do it for nothing.
City Clerk Kingston—The acceptance of the new law by the council is municipal life. The sheriff lives in Strathroy, and it is not likely that he will be willing to attend the meeting of the council.

Ald. Wm. Heaman moved that the salary be \$25.
Ald. Powell said that able men could be had for nothing. He referred to the gratuitous labors of himself and Mr. Robert Pritchard on the London Trust.

Ald. Wm. Heaman—We all know Ald. Powell asked for \$500.
Ald. Powell—Ald. Heaman says a thing that is untrue. We did not ask for \$500. The late Mr. Jeffery thought that our services were worth \$500.

Ald. Heaman—Ald. Powell was on the floor advocating that \$500.
Ald. Powell—It is false.
The matter was referred to No. 1 committee to find out whether Mr. Jones would act.

Ald. Armstrong—Are you prepared to name the man you want, Mr. Mayor?
The Mayor—No; certainly not. If you want a dollar man I will try to get a dollar man.

Ald. Parnell—Well, it's time that the aldermen voted themselves a salary.
The Mayor—If aldermen or mayors do not wish to come here they need not go to the people. I believe in economy as well as anybody else, but that Court of Revision is one of the few offices of the council that I never get on to. It's a place where the city can lose a big lot of money if you have someone there who is not decided and efficient.

The aldermen agreed upon a three-weeks' adjournment, when they re-assemble, according to Ald. Pritchard, as he made it very clear "there will not be a Grit left in the country."
