RIOTOUS SCENES AT MADRID

Points in Spain.

Old London's Loyal Address to King Edward-Row Over the Corpse of Ex-King Milan.

SWORDS DRAWN.

Madrid, Feb. 13 .- With nightfall every approach to the Puerto Del Zol was jammed with the idle populace. Insulting remarks were hurled at the police and the civil guard. A trumpeter sounded a charge, which was made with swords drawn. Heads were not spared and there were many arrests. The crowds sought the shops and hotels. All the front doors of the Hotel de Paris were smashed, a great crowd assembling there. The police and guards charged into the streets leading to the Puerto Del Zol, but the dispersed throngs quickly reassembled. As was anticipated, the funeral of Don Ramon de Compamor was attended with serious disturbance. Considerable disorder marked the progress

of the procession. The authorities have warned the newspapers that they must abstain from criticism of acts of the royal family, or the publication of news, or comments calculated to fan the present agitation.

Effervescence continues at Barcelona and Granada, where the gendarmes have been reinforced. At Malaga anti-clerical demonstrators stoned a newspaper office, and a policeman was wounded by a revolver

LED BY A WOMAN. Yesterday afternoon about 800 students, led by a woman, and bearing French and Spanish flags, assembled in the Puerta del Soles and started cries for the army and against the Jesuits and the Count of Cazerta. They were quickly dispersed, but continued reassembling in different parts of the city. The afternoon was one of continual manifestations, though without serious accident.

Troubles are reported at Carthagena. At Santander a mob stoned the offices of the Catholic journal Atalay (Watch Tower), shouting "Down with the Jesuits." The gendarmes had to fire a volley in the air and charge mob in order to save the Carmelite monastery from which the monks had fled in terror. The rioters fired several shots in reply, and then marched through the streets. When passing the Carlists' houses the occupants poured water on the heads of the rioters, and the latter retaliated by stoning the houses.
