OLD DOCUMENT.

City Clark Unearths Valuable Papers of Early Date.

Report of London and Port Stanley Board of '59 Reveals True Purpose of the Road's Construction.

In a hunt for documents relating to the Lake Erie and Detroit River Railway Company, City Clerk Kingston has discovered a very valuable one, the annual report of Sept. 2, 1857, in which is contained an account of the first year in which it was operated. It was presented at a meeting of the directors by the president. Mr. L. Lawrason, and Mr. W. Bowman, secretary.

Some of the statements made by the president are interesting, because they show that the board of that day had much the same ideas concerning the value of the road as have been voiced The city engineer is delighted, naturally. This morning he was asking everybody he met if they noticed the change, and looked disappointed if loudly in favor of trying for a larger rental than that offered by the Walkers, he has maintained that the road's value should not be considered from this viewpoint alone, but should be largely estimated from the foundation fact that its possession was vastly beneficial to the city indirectly by reason of balking the purposes of the

This argument is backed up by the report of 1857 thus: "The building of this road," says the report, "is altoge-ther a municipal enterprise, and was commenced solely with a view to the general advancement and improvement of the country, and as a check to monopolies, and not from any expectation of profits to be derived from its in-

It will be seen, therefore, that when the road was constructed, direct pe-cuniary benefits were of secondary import and its real value was, as Mayor Rumball contended, in its power to control the trunk lines.

"From the geographical and local po-sition of the London and Port Stanley Railway," it says further, "its direct communication with the leading thoroughfares in the United States and Canada * * * we must come to the conclusion that our railway, with prop-er managament * * * will ultimately become a well-paying road equal, if not superior, to any other short railroad in the province.

The report stated that by the reduction of rates caused by the road in the one year it had been operated, the city saved £11.930.

Fruit for Summer Thirst.

[The Lancet.] Chemical analysis would assign practically no nutritive value to the juicy fruits, for they consist of little more than a cellulose envelope containing

a solution of sugar, the amount varying from 17 per cent, as with grapes, to about 1.4 per cent, as with lemons. The amount of water in fruit is considerable. In watermelons it is no less than 95 per cent; in grapes, 80 per cent; in oranges, 86 per cent; in lemons, 90 per cent; in peaches, 88 per cent; in apples, 82 per cent; in pears, 84 per cent; in plums, 80 per cent; in nec-tarines, 83 per cent, and in strawberres, 90 per cent, not a fruit in the whole category containing less than 80 per cent. The irresistible conclusion, considering these facts, is that fruit plays an important role in diet as a thirst quencher. Certainly, when fruits are freely represented in the diet less fluid requires to be consumed, and fruits would appear to be endowed with a subtle, inimitable flavor which is ample inducement to imbibe fluid

in this most wholesome form. The question so prominent in people's thoughts at this hot season of the year as to what to drink might, therefore, on sound physiological reasoning, be answered, eat sound, ripe, juicy fruit. It is noticeable that as fruit enters into the diet the induigence in alcoholic drinks is diminished. Thus it is most satisfactory to observe people taking a good juicy slice of melon as preparatory to a meal instead of sherry and bitters or a "cocktail." It is a common experience that the more a person drinks to satisfy the demands of thirst in hot weather, the worse he feels. The temptation is to gulp down huge quantities of fluid, with the result that excessive perspiration sets in and a very uncomfortable and unrelieved feeling follows. the other hand, a judicious amount of sound, ripe, juicy fruit, while containing all the water necessary to assuage thirst, would lead to no such distress, and would exercise other healthy effects on the bodily functions.
