PUT THE SCREWS TO THEM

That is Ald. Gerry's Suggestion Regarding Gravel Contractors.

The Won't Live Up to Their Agreement; He Would Make Them.

The board of works had a hard question to deal with at its regular meeting last night, that of the screened gravel supply. The trouble was that the contractors would not supply what man Wyatt, Ald. Gerry and Cooper, "putting the screws to them," as he expressed it.

The members present were: Chairman Wyatt, Ald. Gerry and Cooper, Assistant Engineer Kirkpatrick and Secretary Bell. Mayor Beck was in the city but did not appear at the committee meeting.

The insurance companies' boiler inspector reported that the steam boilers at the city hall had been found in good condition.

A petition from L. Meredith and others was read, signed a sever on Albert street between the west side of Talbot street and 180 feet west. A sufficient number of names was attached and the matter will take the usual course.

The city engineer wrote to say that it was absolutely necessary that they should get gravel repairs on Bathurst, Horton, Richmond, Craig and other streets in No. 1 ward. As Boss & Alexander had refused to deliver screened pit gravel and as they had called for fresh tenders and got no bid, the engineer recommended using unscreened pit gravel under the present contract. He drew attention to a committee motion ordering him to use nothing but screened pit gravel; therefore until he got permission he could not use unscreened pit gravel.

Ald. Cooper thought that unscreened gravel would do—in fact thought it better. His discourse on the subject did not succeed in satisfying Ald. Gerry, who advised making the contractors live up to their agreement. "Put the screws to them," he said. No one could tell him that they could not make the firm live up to their contract. He suggested letting the city solicitor deal with them, which Ald. Cooper thought would mean "another street railway business."

The latter moved that the matter be left to the city engineer and the chairman, and in amendment Ald. Gerry pressed his suggestion to force the contractors to live up to their contract. The motion was carried.

The pay sheet, amounting to \$382.02 was passed and the board adjourned.
