WANDERED IN A TRANCE

But Feminine Charm May Have Had Something To Do With It.

New York, Aug. 9. — The Herald says: Miss Helen Jackson, who has been missing since a week ago last Friday, when he left his ship, the Missouri, then lying in the North River, has been found by his father in Quebec. He was working to make money to return to his ship, but had gone to the Missouri at Bar Harbor, Me., with his father, Jackson says his actions are unaccountable to him. As if he were in a trance, he says, he wandered away from New York. When he recovered his senses and realized the seriousness of his situation, his first thought was to secrete himself until he had made enough money to return to his ship and prove his honor.

In tracing him from Boston, through Montreal to Quebec, said his father, "I found unmistakable evidence that from the time he left the Missouri he was not himself, and that by some strange means his judgment had been rendered inactive. I am pretty well convinced of the cause, and shall leave nothing undone to get at the bottom of the strange affair."

When young Jackson left his ship on shore leave with his friends he met Miss Olga Maxwell, a young woman living in this city. He did not return when his leave expired. On the Monday following his disappearance a general alarm was sent out through the police. The next day Miss Maxwell appeared and said she had left him that morning in Boston.

ANGLO-FRENCH GOOD FEELING

No Menace to Germany in the Present Affinity.

THE JOINT NAVAL REVIEW
Good Expected to Result From Appointment of the Poor Law Commission.

London, Aug. 10. — The whole English people, from King Edward to the ship's coal porter, are entering into the spirit of the Anglo-French alliance and parliamentary amenities, which will begin at Portsmouth on Monday. England certainly makes an impressive show. Her fleet consists of eleven battle ships, five smaller cruisers, and thirty destroyers; and a pretty, if deadly, sight they make at their solemn innoventions on a bright, breezy morning, such as today. King Edward started the Anglo-French entente, and he will be the central figure of next week's doings. Especially is his majesty, like the British Government, anxious to discourage the notion that this affinity between England and France is any menace to Germany. It is quite true, of course, that no deliberate menace is intended, but Germany may be pardoned for regarding it as a menace all the same, and an obstacle to her cherished ambitions.

The Standard says today: "England stands by France. France stands by England, because of no remaining ground of dispute about the past. The wishes to lead the other into a common policy of aggression. Moreover, the intimacy, so far from being a possible cause of distrust, may be regarded as an active agent of reconciliation."

M. de Pressensac suggests that the Anglo-French association may assist in bringing about a satisfactory modus vivendi with the Czar's Government, while England's alliance with the Mikado may be used to avert the peril of a conflict in Indo-China between the outposts of French imperialism and the forward policy of young Japan. For all that, the original and many talkative people in England and Germany get on another's nerves, and the friction is all the greater because England has put out of Germany's reach ambitions which the paralysis of Russia otherwise made realizable. There are abundant evidences here of this irritability. The Times today grows hectic over Russia's reluctance to accept peace, making herself the "puppet of German imperialism" in the more leisurely columns of the weekly reviews one finds similar notes such as the following: "The trend of English feeling towards Germany."

"The liquidation of Heligoland proceeds apace. Since the island was handed over to Germany in 1890, it has lost nearly a quarter of its superficial area; this, in spite of the heroic efforts of German engineers to shore it up. We fear this subsidence of the island belonged to Denmark, not to a German state, we can decry the Nemesis behind nature."

Disraeli once made the gibe that the Reformation pulled down the monastery and built up the workhouse. This week, by the appointment of a royal commission on the poor law, the British Government has taken the first step in pulling down the workhouse. It has become a by-word in English life, tending to depress the unsuccessful into a pauper class, instead of giving them a fresh chance for honest self-supporting industry. It is not improbable that the new inquiry will lead Englishmen away from the terribly centralized system of pauperism, and some form of revival of the old parish responsibility for its own poor, under far more elastic methods.

The nearest parallel to the casually unemployed, who are clamoring in many parts of industrial England, is the subject of one of the few acts of the parliament passed in 1894, known as the measure depends on private charity. The labor members sought in vain to provide for public management and maintenance of farm colonies. They console themselves by the reflection that this will be the duty of the next Liberal Government.

It is hoped that Miss Alice Roosevelt will visit London next year as the guest of Whitehall, Reid, the American ambassador. The difficulties of precedence which are supposed to have proved an obstacle to her visit in the coronation year, would not, of course, arise now.

SHARK FISHING

Honolulu Sport With Harpoon or Hook and Horse's Body for Bait.

Honolulu, Aug. 10. — One of Honolulu's most exciting pastimes is shark fishing. Large sharks abound off Honolulu harbor, and a party of fishermen may usually count on bringing home one or two sea monsters from eight to fourteen feet long by going three or four miles from shore. The fish may either be harpooned or hooked, the latter method being the easier. The harpooning is more dangerous and more difficult.

The shark fishers need a small launch, a dead horse, some harpoons or hooks and some large caliber rifles. The horse is sometimes killed a day or two before the expedition, as sharks are supposed to like their horse meat "high." This is not necessary, however, and is not advisable, for there is no special pleasure in dragging through the harbor a horse that has been dead long enough really to resent it.

The horse is tied at the end of a rope and left to float about six miles away from the launch out in the open sea, and then the wait for sharks begins. A shark will usually show up in a very short time. A bright line of sixty feet he is a long green object of indefinite outlines. He approaches the dead horse slowly until a few feet away and then veers off to one side.

When harpooning is to be done, the bait is drawn gradually close until the shark comes right up to the boat. The harpoon is plunged into him and the battle begins. The shark will fling itself to water and tow the boat at a rapid pace. His strength is extraordinary and the fight is sure to be a long one. There is nothing for it but to tire him out, and the only way to do this is to let him struggle as he will. Gradually he is drawn nearer and nearer to the boat, and soon he is hauled to the surface in a condition of approaching exhaustion. Then the rifles come into play, but at the first shots he will often carry the harpoon and rope with him again and renew the fight.

There is a spot under the gills where a fatal wound can be inflicted with a rocket rifle bullet, but shooting in a rocketing manner is not to be accurate, and the right spot is seldom reached at once.

The sharks are more easily hooked than harpooned. A line is cast from the boat and a box with a splendid view of them is thrown. The shark is referred to the other half of the baited dog was placed on a large hook and led among them. Through the glass a huge shark was seen slowly approaching, turn and seize the bait, in some way or other the hook failed to catch and the shark let go when the rope was jerked. But he came back at once and seized it again. Two men, pulling as sailors pull on a halyard, slowly drew him to the surface, where a clever fisherman, with his hand and jaws, with five rows of sword-teeth, Four men with heavy rifles stood ready to shoot him and at the word the parliamentary order was given. The shark was jerked back and a jerk that got the line away from those who were holding it, and down he went to deep water again. He was hauled up and a spear shot was fired into his head, while the shark of the party used a spear to reach a vital spot. Under this sort of attack the shark was killed. The shark was 12 feet 4 inches in length.

Many tourists who come to Honolulu get up shark-fishing parties. There are launchmen and assistants for hire. The shark usually goes to the fisherman who help, and a small sum is to be realized from the oil its liver affords.

CHURCHES CONFER ON FEDERATION

Delegates of 18,000,000 Protestant Communicants Meet at New York City.

New York, Aug. 9. — Twenty-four religious denominations, containing 18,000,000 communicants, have each appointed from five to twenty delegates to meet in this city on November 15, to take part in an inter-church conference on federation. The meeting will be held in Carnegie hall for a week, the object being the federation of the Protestant forces in America. President Roosevelt has expressed his sympathy with the movement, and it is expected that one or more members of his cabinet will be able to take part in the discussions of the conference.

Among the issues to be brought before the church and nation by the conference are religious education, social order, evangelization, home and foreign missions, the fellowship of the national life and Christian progress. Besides declared faith in the essential unity of the Protestant churches, several speakers will re-emphasize the practical workings of present federation movements in cities, rural districts, states, foreign lands and inter-denominational work. Denominational rallies, a platform meeting devoted to young people's movements and a reception to the delegates at the Waldorf Astoria given by the half dozen denominational social unions in this city will be among the more popular features of the conference.
