LONDON PASTOR DECLINES CALLS TO TWO CHARGES IN SHORT TIME

Quartet Secured for the First Presbyterian Church C

Stratford Church May Invite Rev. A. J. MacGillivray.

Rev. Dr. Johnston Occupies His Former Pulpit at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church.

Rev. Thomas S. Johnson, who until recently was pastor of the Adelaide Street Baptist Church, has during the past few weeks received invitations to take up the work in other places. One of the calls came from a place in the Northwest where the Baptist denomination has a splendid field open to it, and the other was from a charge in Ontario. Both, however, were declined. Mr. Johnson, not desiring to re-enter the active ministry for some time.

Owing to extensive improvements being made in the interior of the First Presbyterian Church, it is unlikely that the edifice will be occupied by the congregation before the middle of October. There is still much to be done by the decorators. The reorganization of the choir by the new leader and organist, Mr. George Phelps, is now under way. The quartet is completed, and the members of the choir will organize on Friday next, and the ladies will do likewise in about ten days.

Rev. Dr. Johnston, formerly of the Presbyterian Church, Montreal, preached yesterday morning and evening in his old pulpit at St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, and was welcomed by his hundreds of friends. Both morning and evening there were large crowds present, and many being turned away in the evening. In his morning sermon he referred to the modern day riches, for which men were tempted to the short-cut by unwise speculation. The short-cut, he said, is the one of the untried of the business life of today, said Dr. Johnston. The preacher was listened to with the greatest interest, and he expressed his pleasure at being among his old friends.

Rev. W. J. Clark will occupy his pulpit at the First Presbyterian Church on the first Sunday in September. Rev. Frank Ballantyne, this city, is in charge of Mr. Clark's work in the meantime.

Rev. J. H. Riddell, B. A., principal of Albert College, Edmonton, occupied the pulpit of the First Methodist Church yesterday morning and made an appeal for funds. He is collecting a small balance of the \$17,000 required to build the college, of which he is to be the head. He spoke optimistically of the Northwest, and made an eloquent address.

Rev. Dr. Cameron, of Ottawa, preached yesterday at the Tabernacle Baptist Church before large congregations.
