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ANNUAL SESSION OF SYNOD OF HURON

Important Gathering of Anglicans Will Assemble in Cronyn Hall on Tuesday.

The fifty-second session of the Synod of the Diocese of Huron will open at 3 o'clock on Tuesday afternoon in St. Paul's Cathedral, and a very large number of those who will attend arrived in the city today.

A meeting of the delegates will be held this evening in Huron College. Rev. Canon Davis will preside, and an address will be given by Rev. R. S. W. Howard of "The Pan-Anglican Congress." The discussion following will be participated in by Ven. Archdeacon Richardson, Rev. Canon Brown, of Paris, and Rural Dean Chadwick, of Windsor.

There will also be held in Huron College this evening a banquet of the Huron College Alumni Association, when a number of addresses will be given.

Clergy Assemble.
Tomorrow morning the clergy will assemble at 8 o'clock for breakfast, and following the meal, a meeting will be held. Ven. Archdeacon Hill will preside, and an address on "The Ordering of Priests" will be given by Rural Dean Wallace, of Woodstock, and the discussion will be led by Rev. S. P. Irwin, of Watford; Rev. V. M. Durnford, of Waterloo, and Rev. R. B. Everett, of Port Huron.

The synod meeting proper opens at 1 o'clock in the afternoon. Prior to the opening, the quarterly meeting of the executive committee will be held in Cronyn Hall. In the morning holy communion will be celebrated at 10:30 o'clock, and Ven. Archdeacon McKenney will preach.

Bishop Will Preach.
His Lordship Bishop Williams will preside, and it is likely that his charge will be given to the synod at tomorrow afternoon's meeting. He will touch upon a number of the questions to come up for consideration, particularly mentioning the questions of church union, laymen's missionary movement, and revision of the hymnal.

A notice of motion by the bishop that it is desirable to form the dioceses of Ontario now in the ecclesiastical province of Canada into a separate ecclesiastical province will be considered.

A great deal of discussion will take place on a proposed amendment to the canon on restraining undue expenditure in church building.

SACRED CONCERT WAS LARGELY PATRONIZED

Tremendous Crowd Listened to Programme Rendered by Two Bands.

Despite the threatening nature of the weather and the damp grass, that made conditions anything but favorable for fluffy summer dresses, the sacred concert in Victoria Park last night was a great success. It is not likely that even under the most favorable circumstances there could have been more people gathered in the park. Immediately after the church services the concert began, and the worshippers from the near-by churches soon formed a solid phalanx around the bandstand, while the more distant churches kept constantly pouring in their quota to swell the crowd. By 9 o'clock there must have been considerably more than 5,000 people in the park. It was a very pretty sight. The light dresses of the ladies standing out in relief against the sober hues of the men, while the scarlet coats of the soldiers added still more to the brightness of the scene.

The Twenty-sixth Middlesex Band gave a very fine programme, and its numbers were heartily applauded. The concert came to a close shortly before 10, owing to a threatening thunderstorm, but even then the people were loath to leave. The concert was beyond all question greatly appreciated.

WRESTLERS IN LONG BOUT.
Calumet, Mich., June 13.—John Rowett, of Besenau, and Joe Sishir, Calumet world's champion at Corvish, wrestled, wrestled two hours and a half for the championship last night, going to no decision. The match ended at midnight. Rowett got the only fall, taking twenty hitches and going an hour and ten minutes to get it. They will be matched again later.

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STRAWBERRIES ON THE MARKET ON TUESDAY

Keep One Eye Peeled for the Canadian Variety Tomorrow—Some Fruit Gossip.

The fruit season is beginning, and within a week or so now will be in full swing. So far there have been no local strawberries offered for sale in the city, and consequently the best berries have not been obtainable up to the present, as the Canadian berry is the best in the world.

On Tuesday it is expected that there will be a supply of local berries on the market. These are from Essex County. The first of the Niagara district berries will be in by the end of the week. These come from around Jordan Harbour, where the earliest crop is found. The remainder of the peninsula, from Winona to Beamsville and Vineland, is about a week later, so the full crop will not be producing for nearly two weeks. From then on, however, there will be almost a continuous supply, as the Oakville and Clarkson berries, and those from around Burlington, which are the best in the country, will not be producing till the Niagara crop is practically exhausted. The berry that will be on sale this week is the Michael, a comparatively small, very red variety, that is noted for its sweetness, and is one of the best preserving varieties.

Two Varieties.
The Williams and Clide, the white-tipped varieties, that are the favorites for preserving, will not be obtainable for some weeks yet, as they are a week or more later than the Michaels.

Some new varieties have been introduced in the immediate vicinity of London, and they promise to be very productive, and of fine quality. They will be on sale towards the end of this week or the beginning of the next. Mr. C. W. Baker, the president of the local branch of the O. V. G. A., in speaking of the berry situation, said that there would be less fruit offered on the market than usual, as the growers had united to sell to the large buyers. This had not been done with any idea of holding up the market, and it was not expected that any such would result. The reason for the step was the imperative need of putting more time on the cultivation of the patches, which was impossible with the amount of time necessary to sell the fruit on the open market.

Mr. Baker sees no likelihood of a glutted market. The canning factories are buying so largely now that it is almost impossible to overstock the market. If the berries drop as low as 7 cents, Mr. Baker thinks, it will be about the limit. They may go somewhat lower at certain times, but this is about as moderate as can be reasonably expected.

Danger Yet.
There is as yet, of course, considerable danger of a heavy frost doing great damage to the crop, but the danger of this is becoming less every day, and there is every prospect of a good strawberry year.

With regard to other fruit it is a little early to speak definitely. The raspberry crop, however, which was remarkably light last year, shows signs of being a record-breaker this year. The raspberry is very subject to blight, however, and sometimes with just as good prospects as there are this year the crop has been a comparative failure. Still everything points to a good supply. Currants, gooseberries and other fruits of the variety look as though they would be very profitable this year. They will be somewhat later this year, but the season, if anything has been to their advantage, as the abundance of rain has tended to give late fruit, while the danger of frost is less likely at this time of year than in an earlier season. The worst that has to be feared now, apart from some unexpected blight, is that the season will be very hot, which has a tendency to scald the berries and ripen them too fast for proper handling.

Large Fruit.
In the larger fruits there is a very good prospect also. Cherries were only a medium crop last year, but the blossoms this year seem to suggest that the supply will be a very large one. Plums and pears have been fairly productive lately and it is expected that this season will see an exception, and peaches will likely be better crop. The Elberta, one of the best canning varieties, is especially well-blossomed, while the Crawford shows signs of being better loaded than in the past year or so.

Apple prospects are looking very favorable. All varieties have shown fine blossoming, and as late rain will be an off year it is likely that there will be a bumper crop this fall. This is especially true of the more fancy varieties that have been very short for several years past.

Altogether the prospects for the fruit season are very bright. Of course there are always a number of circumstances that may arise to damage the supply at this early stage of the season, but aside from that there is no doubt that this will be one of the best fruit seasons in a number of years.

Toronto, June 12.—The appointment of S. A. Armstrong as assistant provincial secretary, succeeding Thomas Mulvey, K.C., resigned, is gazetted today.

ESCAPED FROM JAIL.
St. Catharines, June 12.—William Campbell, arrested on the charge of stealing five tons of ballast from the O'Neill bridge over the Welland Canal, escaped from the lockup some time during last night. He is supposed to have been aided by friends. Campbell was to have appeared in the police court this morning.

STEPMOTHER MURDERER EXPIATES HIS CRIME

William Scott Went to Electric Chair at Auburn This Morning.

Auburn, N. Y., June 14.—William Scott was successfully electrocuted in Auburn Prison this morning for the murder of his stepmother, Mrs. Della M. Scott, near Chenango Lake, a short distance from Norwich, in October of 1907. Two shocks were used to kill. The first one was of 1,500 volts at 8 1/2 amperes, and lasted for 3 seconds beyond a minute; and the second one, of full strength, was on but ten seconds.

Scott walked to the death chair fearlessly and without evidencing the least sign of emotion. Scott shot his stepmother while they were in the wagon together on a trip, the ostensible purpose of which Scott said was to purchase a stove. The body was thrown into some brambles in a wooded part of the country, and it was not found until Scott, under arrest on suspicion of the murder, led officials to the place several days later.

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A BRAVE NURSE

Knowingly Opened an Internal Wound to Help a Child.

London, June 14.—An appeal is issued signed by Lord Beauchamp, the Hon. Rupert Guinness, M. P., and others, on behalf of the Metropolitan Asylums board nurse named Murray, who permanently injured herself by an act of heroism.

It was necessary that a child requiring immediate tracheotomy should be carried to a doctor, and Nurse Murray although she knew that the physical effort would result in the reopening of a dangerous internal wound, sacrificed herself, with the result as stated.

The Metropolitan board can only grant her a gratuity, and the case does not come within the scope of the Carnegie fund, and as Nurse Murray is without private resources, the appeal is now made.
