**MURDEROUS CONVICTS MAKE FOR ALASKA**  
**Russian Penal Colony Will Attempt to Cross Bering Straits.**

Seattle, Wash., June 30.—A cable dispatch from Nome, Alaska, describes a bloody outbreak of Russian political prisoners in the Yakutsk district, Siberia, and the flight of the murderers across the wilderness toward Behring Straits in an effort to reach Alaska.

Advices from Vladimir section of Northern Siberia across Behring Straits state that a band of prisoners in the Yakutsk district revolted, overrunning the guards, and started on a retreat of 2,000 miles from the camp where they planned to take small boats and make the main land of Alaska 36 miles away.

Capt. Kallinkoff, acting governor of the district, ordered Cossacks to take the prisoners. The fugitives, in a bloody battle, one Cossack and wounded, were forcing them to retreat. Approaching an Esquimaux village, the convicts passed the natives, who were armed and equipped with food, clothing and tools. When the Esquimaux resisted, a number were shot.

Capt. Kallinkoff sent a warning by special messenger to East Cape, and that place was garrisoned against any further advance. The report reaching here is that the convicts are expected to try to make Dionides, in the centre of Behring Straits. A Russian cruiser is expected daily at Vladivostok and may intercept the fugitives, Capt. Kallinkoff says the convicts are murderers and criminals of the worst sort.

**HAD PRIVATE PACT.**  
Toronto, June 29.—A falling out between the hotelmen of Massey in Algoma and the town council there has disclosed a rather strange state of affairs. Two years ago the license fee was \$700 and last year it was reduced to \$250. Half the license fee was to go to the municipality and half to the Government. By a private arrangement the hotelmen agreed to pay in addition to their \$250, a similar amount to the town. The municipality then receives \$375 and the Government \$125. A new council was elected this year, and because some stringent regulations were made, the hotelmen and council have fallen out, with the result that the Government has heard of the private arrangement.
