

# **VERDICT STARTLES** IN BAYFIELD CASE

Coroner's Jury Says That Mrs Burns Was Murdered.

BY PERSONS UNKNOWN

Invalid Daughter Was in House, But Could Throw No Light on the Mystery.

Bayfield, Ont., July 22. - That deceased came to her death at the hands of some person or persons unknown and that the case was manifestly not one of suicide, was the verdict returned this evening by the coroner's jury inquiring into the death of Mrs. James Burns, of this place. on the mystery. On Thursday of last week, when W. J. Burns, the husband, came home from his work he found his wife lying dead on the bed, with a stocking twisted around her neck, and with bruise on her forehead.
