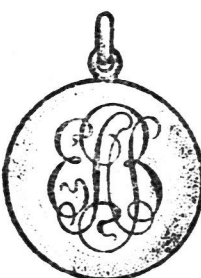

Large Numbers Have Prepared
for Their Christmas
Dinners.

London are this week inhabited by
fine large live turkeys as the result
of the owners of the properties being
lucky with the dice. Last week a
number of west enders journeyed to
a farm house in the surrounding coun-
try and there tossed the bits of bones
for the high numbers. They had, with-
out exception, a lucky streak, and all
wended their way home with a fat
bird, tied by the feet, under their
arms. They will not have to eat
roast beef on Christmas Day, even
though turkey prices are extraordi-
narily high.

Mr. Thomas Taylor, of Mount Pleas-
ant, returned home yesterday

Taylor reports deer very plentiful this
season. A good quantity of game was
bagged and brought to this city by
the party. Venison dinners will be
partaken of in the near future in many
homes, as Mr. Taylor has supplied
many friends with nice juicy steaks.

John Leather, West street, on
Wednesday evening next.

Through the assistance of The Ad-
vertiser want ad, columns, Miss Hy-
lson, of Blackfriars street, had restored
to her a valuable gold-headed umbrella

twenty fine homes. Building has boom-

A short time ago a local newspaper

over here, either. This end of the city
is an ideal place to live in."

Now Ask for Higher Duty on Pork

Ottawa, Nov. 16.—The member for
East Middlesex has received three
petitions which he presented to the
House yesterday. They call for an in-
creased duty on pork shipped into this
country, the reason given being that
the United States market, being over-
stocked with pork, the overplus is be-
ing dumped into Canada at prices be-
low the market rates, and the Cana-
dian trade is suffering. Two of the
petitions are from Westminster and
one from London. Over a hundred
and sixty signatures are at-
tached.

Mr. J. A. MacDonald Will Not Run

Toronto, Nov. 16.—It was learned
yesterday that Mr. J. A. MacDonald,
editor of the Globe, had been official-
ly requested to allow his name to go
before the North Middlesex Liberal
convention at Alisa Craig. When in-
terviewed Mr. MacDonald declined to
discuss the matter.

It was ascertained, however, that
while he expressed pleasure at the
honour, and made it clear that if de-
sired of entering Parliament, he would
rather accept a nomination from his
old home constituency, yet he could
not on account of present engage-
ments as well as personal disinclina-
tions to enter the active political arena
accept the proposition at this time.
