FEELING FOR WAR

Peruvians Anxious To Take a Crack

at the Ecuadorians.

[Associated Press.]

Lima, April 5.—An imposing demon-

stration by 5,000 persons, excited by

the events at Guayaquil, took place

last night. After removing the arms

of the Ecuadorian consulate the crowd

proceeded to the principal square in

front of the palace and called for the

president to speak. President Leguia

came out on the balcony and addressed

the assemblage. He recommended

that the people retire in an orderly

manner, and hoped that the spontane-

ous demonstration of patriotism would

be converted into a reality in case of

necessity.

The cabinet council has decided to

demand immediate and full satisfac-

tion from Ecuador for the insults

against the Peruvian legation at Quito

and the consulate at Guayaquil, and

the attacks made upon Peruvians in

Ecuador and their property.

In case of a negative reply from the

Ecuadorian Government it is pro-

posed to send troops against that

country and a squadron to blockade

the River Guayas, on which Guaya-

quil is situated.

The Government has called up the

reserves, and within a month can mus-

ter 40,000 men.

TEXTILE FIRM IS**LOOKING OVER LONDON**Concern Intends Establishing a
Large Canadian Branch.Representatives of a large American
textile firm, located in Philadelphia,
were in the city yesterday looking over
the situation here with a view of locat-
ing a branch factory in London.The president stated to The Adver-
tiser that the concern is going to estab-
lish a large Canadian branch as quickly
as possible, and that he thought from
what he had seen already that it would
be located either in Hamilton or Lon-
don.The firm manufactures all sorts of
textile fabrics, and does a large Cana-
dian trade. The matter is being
taken up with the manufacturers' com-
mittee, and it is understood that the
concern is willing to put up \$20,000 if
