BYRON AT PREVEZA.
The Three-Italian war is likely to
provide the literary gossip with plen-
ty of "reminiscences." For instance
it is interesting to recall that it was
at Preveza, in the Gulf of Arta, where
Byron landed for his tour through
Albania and there also he began the
second canto of "Childe Harold,"
which he finished, by the way, at
Smyrna, another landmark in the
poet's life. Byron's biography of Byron,
which was reported in that quarter the
other day, Preveza is in the vilayet of Jan-
ina, where, it is recorded in the Hon-
orable House of Commons, the poet was
supplied by order of the
Pasha with a house, horses and all
necessaries gratis. All himself being
about besieging Ibrahim in Illyria.
Readers familiar with "Childe Har-
old" will remember the very graphic
description of the Gulf of Arta given
by the poet in a note to the poem.
Byron's first glimpse of a night scene
round the camp fires, with a back-
ground of rugged rocks and Albanian
soldiers dancing in the frelight, and
singing fierce and sad songs with the
restrain, "Klithi, klithi, Parga!" ("rob-
bers all at Parga"). On leaving Jan-
ina, Byron went to Missolonghi,
thence to Vostizza, where he caught
his first glimpse of the heights of Par-
nassus. — Pall Mall Gazette.

FRENCH REVOLUTIONARY ANNIVERSARY.
Today being the anniversary of the
massacre of the Carmelite nuns of
September, 1792, the crypt of their
church in the Rue de Valenciennes was
thrown open to visitors, and those who
liked might gaze on the piled-up bones
and skulls that are arranged so neat-
ly in the red draped chapel beneath
the great jet black crown of thorns.
Much of the beautiful garden of the
Carmelite convent still remains, and
the building itself has not been al-
tered. Its picturesqueness is due to
its position upon the pleasant orchard where
apples and pears are ripening in the sun
and where white and yellow water
lilies grow freely in the small circu-
lar pool. — Paris correspondence Lon-
don Evening Standard.

THREE WAYS TO COOK EGGS

Baked Eggs. Put a spoonful of milk
into a deep dish, for each egg you wish
to cook. Break the eggs carefully as you
do not to jar them; salt and pepper and bake
until the whites are set.

Creamed Eggs.—Butter a pudding dish
and pour into the bottom half a pint
of cream. Have ready six hard-boiled eggs,
which have been in cold water for four
hours. Peel off the shells and chop
rather coarsely. Put them in the cream
and mix with a fork and salt and
dust with butter. Pour the rest of the
cream upon the chopped eggs; set in the
oven, covered and bake twenty minutes.
The cream and butter will be melted and
the eggs and brown very lightly. Send
to table in the bakedish and eat hot.

Eggs au Gratin.—Divide six hard-
boiled eggs into halves, lengthwise, and
place in a circle around butter. Prepare
a sauce as follows: Melt one tablespoonful
of butter, add one tablespoonful of
flour, one-half teaspoonful of salt, a dash
of cayenne pepper, one-half teaspoonful
of water, same amount of cream, two table-
spoonfuls of grated cheese. Boil for
two or three minutes, add two raw egg
yolks; mix well and pour at once over
the eggs, sprinkle with buttered cracker
crumbs, and brown in a quick oven.

Bonbons. Mix together with the whites
of two eggs an equal quantity of cold
water and enough confectioner's sugar
to make a stiff paste. Take seeds out
of dates and fill with the cream. Blanch
almonds and cover with the cream. Make
little balls of the cream and stick a
dried cherry up a half English walnut
