GERMAN JACK TARS PERISH; CRUISER HITS TORPEDO BOAT

Three Score Men of the Kaiser's Navy Lost in Collision in the North Sea Off the Island of Helgoland-Vessel Was of Most Modern Type of Destroyer.

Berlin, March 5.-From fifty to sixty men were drowned when the German cruised Yorck rammed torpedo boat G 178 last night in the North Sea off Heligoland. The torpedo boat sank, only 15 memhers of its crew being saved.

Heligoland, Germany, March 5. -Sixty-four of the crew of the German torpedo boat G 178, weredrowned, together with their commanding officer, Lieut, Kich, after the little vessel had been rammed by the cruiser Yorck off this Island in the North Sea last even-
