Of the money spent, \$19,315 went into the purchase and remodelling of headquarters in Ottawa. Mr. Draper reported that the congress represented 173,778 paid memories, and there were many more whose memberships had not been kept up because they were out of work, so that he thought 225,000 workers were spoken for by the congress. These were in 2,000 local unions.
