OPPOSE CHANGES IN I. R. U. RULES

Delegates At Annual Meeting Concur in Decision Against Americanizing Canadian Game.

Toronto, Dec. 11.—Two decisions of considerable moment were reached at the annual meeting of the Interprovincial Rugby Union, held at the Military Institute on Saturday. The first was that the union was against any radical change in the rules, such as the forward pass or running interference which would tend to Americanize the Canadian game, and the other was to foster the game among the younger players by enlarging the intercollegiate series and organizing a junior series.

The discussion of changes in the rules were lengthy, and a number of suggestions were advanced whereby the game can be improved, and a number of recommendations will be forwarded to the Canadian Rugby Union this week. These include increasing the penalties for committed fouls, and several other improvements which the need of was made apparent during the last season.

In deciding to foster intercollegiate and junior rugby, the meeting went on record as being opposed to encroaching on any territory which is now considered as being under the O. R. U. banner, with the exception of the Ottawa Valley.

Victoria, Dec. 9.—Vancover Maroons took a fresh hold on the escalator rail and climbed out of the cellar of the Pacific Coast Hockey League last night when they defeated the Victoria Cougars by a 4 to 2 in a bitterly contested game.

The Maroons gave a display of concerted play which brought out the best efforts of veterans and recruits alike. Hugh Lehman was back in Vancouver's line for the first league game of the season, and his presence was felt by the Victoria sharpshooters throughout the game.

GOULLET-BELLONI TEAM WIN GRIND

Is Former's Seventh Win in Last Six Years—Garden Bike Events.

New York, Dec. 11.—Ald Goulet of Newark and his Italian partner, Gaston Belloni, won the thirty-third international six-day bicycle race in a thrilling finish before a capacity crowd at Madison Square Garden last night. The Italian-American pair, triumphant survivors of a grind which had continued without intermission since last Sunday midnight, finished the 143 hours with 2,457 miles and eight laps to their credit, and the commanding total of 4,487 points.

In the same lap at the finish were the pair, Maurice Broeze of France and Willie Coburn of Newark, but despite sensational riding in the final hours, they trailed the winning combination by nearly 200 points, scoring 352.

Osar Egg, Swiss rider, and his partner, Ray Easton of East Orange, N.J., finished third, a lap behind the winning total, having piled up 435 points.

Of the sixteen teams that wheeled around the giant saucer at the starting gun, only seven remained to the finale. After the leading trio were scored as follows:

1. Goulet and Belloni, 4,487 points.

2. Broeze and Coburn, 2,457 points.

3. Egg and Easton, 435 points.

Harry Horan and Tommy Fitzsimmons, 2,457 miles, 5 laps—53 points.

Willie Coburn and Sam Gaetman, 2,457 miles, 5 laps—53 points.

His triumph last night gave Goulet his seventh victory in six-day races in this city, five of them scored in the last six years.
