Striking Miners of U. S. Anthracite Fields Losing \$1,200,000 Daily.

Canadian Press Desratch Ottawa, Sept. 1.-The executive of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada were instructed by the na tional convention here today to send a telegram to John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers of America, extending the sympathy and moral support of the Trades and Labor Congress to the striking anthracite miners in the United States.

#### 158,000 MEN OUT.

Philadelphia, Sept. 1.—A peaceful but complete, tieup of the hard coal fields was reported today as the re sult of the suspension instituted by 158,000 mine workers at midnight.

The last of the miners quit the pits on the stroke of twelve, which terminated the late two-year contract with the operators. Work will not be resumed until the contract is renewed. Attempts to negotiate re-newal have so far failed. The depar-ture of the last squads of men was

The first shift of the 10,000 maintenance men who will police the mines throughout the suspension, by mutual agreement with the owners, took their assigned places without any bitch. The iors will thus be indirectly contribut-ing about \$100,000 a month to the union's war chest.
