AT CANADA'S MERCY

Congressman Fordney, of Michigan, a great lumber expert, was recently spoken the other day at Washington. "I am much afraid," he said, "that the paper, pulp and pulpwood schedule in this tariff bill will bring severe punishment on the paper mill and news paper industry of the United States. I regard that feature of our bill as very dangerous and I am sure we could not have formed it to take better care of these important American interests. I believe the language of the bill will be certain to excite retaliation in return. It did before when the Dingee bill was passed and the language in this bill was very hostile. We have many paper mills in this country that are already dependent upon Canada for their pulpwood. If Canada, under some plan to prevent the export of that wood, and that is what I expect it will mean, perhaps half the paper mills in the United States will be driven to Canada. Then all our publishers, big and little, will be at the mercy of Canada. I think that by all means this bill should have been framed to constitute Canada in this respect and I tried very hard to have it so, but failed. It is up now before the Provincial Governments of Canada, to see that the results anticipated by Mr. Fordney are realized as soon as possible.—Ex.
