## COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON TUESDAY

Large Amount of Business  
Transacted—Number of  
Petitions Received  
**THE NEW MAYOR**

The Town Council held their  
first meeting for some time on  
Tuesday evening. His Worship  
Mayor Andrew presiding for the  
first time. There were also present  
Councillors Pinault, Sanson, Miller,  
Alexander, White and Lunam, and  
Town Solicitor MacKenzie.

Before calling on the Town  
Clerk to read the minutes of pre-  
vious meetings, His Worship made  
a few remarks expressing his ap-  
preciation of the high honor done  
him, and although at first he was  
diffident of accepting the nomina-  
tion yet when he was informed that  
his nomination paper was signed by  
over one hundred names he was  
constrained to let it go.

He hoped that the confidence of  
the electors would not be misplaced  
and that the work of the council  
would go on as under the regime  
of the late Mayor.

The minutes of the last three  
meetings were read and confirmed.  
Communication was read from  
R. G. O'Brien, secretary of the  
Fire Brigade, asking that two  
small chemical engines be added  
to the brigade equipment. Letter  
laid on table.

Communication from H. Bragg  
asking for subscription to Can-  
adian Municipal Year Book was  
ordered placed on file.

Communication from W. S.  
Hooper, Mayor of Fredericton ex-  
pressing regret and sympathy at  
the death of the late Mayor Murray  
was ordered placed on file, and the  
clerk instructed to reply thereto.

Communication from the town  
auditor, M. A. Kelly notifying  
council that he had audited the  
books of the town treasurer up to  
December 31st, 1912, and had  
found them correct. Report ac-  
cepted and placed on file.

Communication from W. W.  
Doherty notifying the town that  
he would hold the town respon-  
sible if the dam at Smith's Lake  
burst, and caused any damage to  
his property. Letter placed on file.

Communication read from a  
committee of the firemen asking for  
further necessary equipment. Laid  
on table.

Communication read from the  
Board of Trade asking that the  
council take steps and legislation  
necessary to make the citizens con-  
form to the bye-laws by removing  
shacks from districts 1 and 2.  
This was referred to By-Laws and  
Legislation Committee.

The report of School Trustees  
up to 30th June, 1912, found cor-  
rect by the auditors, Messrs. J. S.  
Benson and M. A. Kelly was re-  
ceived from the secretary Mr. S.  
Lauchlan and placed on file.

A petition was then presented  
from the rate-payers of Ward 3, ac-  
companied by the sworn declara-  
tion of Mr. J. L. Boudreau, and a  
similar petition from the rate-pay-  
ers of Ward 2, with sworn declara-  
tions of Mr. Jos. Damboise and  
Mr. N. Bernatchez, praying that  
at the first civic election a vote be  
also taken as to whether the rate-  
payers desire local option or li-  
cense.

Mr. W. A. Trueman who was  
present signified his intention of  
opposing the petitions and on re-  
ceiving permission to be heard be-  
fore the council stated that he ap-  
peared on behalf of the Temper-  
ance Federation, and opposed the  
petitions on several grounds; main-  
ly confining his remarks to two ob-  
jections, mainly that it was impos-  
sible for the persons making the  
declarations to know that 25 p.c.  
of the ratepayers had signed, as no  
proper ward lists were asked for as  
provided by law, and that many  
signatures had been made on Sun-  
days. The other objections were  
formal, being made to cover pos-  
sible eventualities, the objections  
not having access to the petitions.

Mr. A. T. LeBlanc who appeared in a  
legal capacity for the petitions, replied to  
that conditions were exactly the same, and  
the same procedure had been followed as  
was done when the Temperance party peti-  
tioned to have the vote taken.

## NEW OFFICE IN THE C.P.R. CREATED

H. A. Chandler of Campbell-  
ton is Appointed Divisional  
Surveyor.

In accordance with a policy  
which has been adopted on other  
parts of the C.P.R., a new office,  
that of divisional surveyor, has  
been created on the Atlantic Division.  
The new official is H. A. Chandler  
of Campbellton, whose appointment  
dates from March 1. His duties  
will include the preparation of  
plans and descriptions for the pur-  
chase, sale and lease of land, re-  
surveys of the right of way, surveys  
of other lands and all such surveys  
which come within the jurisdiction  
of the operation and maintenance  
department. Mr. Chandler will  
have his office in St. John and his  
work will cover the entire Atlantic  
division. This work has formerly  
been performed by surveyors not  
connected with the road, but it has  
assumed such proportions that it  
has been found necessary to ap-  
point a special official to look after  
it. Similar appointments have been  
made recently in Montreal and To-  
ronto, and at North Bay.

The papers were filed as required by  
law and in the absence of other sworn  
declarations must be accepted, unless evi-  
dence was adduced before a higher tribunal  
showing the declarations to be false. Mr.  
Trueman in reply said that the act was  
changed since the Temperance people  
petitioned for a vote, but His Worship  
pointed out that both Mr. LeBlanc and Mr.  
Trueman were wrong as the act was now  
as it had been then, and the Temperance  
party had been supplied with ward lists.

Councillor White said that if the law  
had been complied with the petitions  
would have to be received and arrange-  
ments made for taking the vote at the  
next election.

In reply to a query from Councillor Lun-  
am, Town Solicitor MacKenzie read the  
authority from the act, and stated in his  
opinion that the requirements of the act  
had been carried out. The only doubt in  
his mind was in regard to the ward lists,  
and if the council desired he would get an  
opinion on the matter.

It was then moved by Councillor Pinault  
seconded by Councillor White that the  
petitions be received and arrangements  
made for taking the vote.

Moved in amendment by Councillor  
Alexander, seconded by Councillor Lunam  
that the matter be referred to the town  
solicitor to report at an early meeting.  
Amendment carried.

Mr. Trueman and Mr. LeBlanc then  
thanked the council and withdrew.

Councillor Alexander then moved and it  
was carried that the Town solicitor be in-  
structed to procure an authority on the  
matter of the license petitions.

A petition was received from a number  
of the ratepayers praying that the council  
take steps to at once widen O'Leary  
Street. Laid on table.

A largely signed petition was received  
from the ratepayers regarding the apathy  
of the council in the matter of enforcing  
the By-Laws and notifying them that the  
town would be held responsible in case of  
damage by fire.

Councillor Lunam spoke strongly on  
this subject and His Worship said the by-  
laws should have been enforced long ago,  
and until they are tested we are unaware  
whether they are good or not.

The Town Solicitor stated he was quite  
ready to test the by-laws if they state a  
case against whom to proceed, to which  
there was no answer.

The following accounts were ordered  
paid: Water and sewerage dept., \$144.02;  
Fire Dept., \$207.38; Finance, \$1710; Public  
Charities, \$59.25; Public Property, and  
Streets, \$78.63; Electric Light, \$985.31.

Police and License Committee recom-  
mended that the following licenses be  
granted: H. Malcolm, restaurant, \$10; M.  
E. Roy, jeweller, \$25; A. & R. Loggie, to  
sell by ret., \$20.

Chief Hughes on recommendation of  
committee was granted increase in salary  
to \$1000 on consideration of his resigning  
the liquor license inspectorship. Increase  
to commence on date of resignation.

The matter of fire brigade equipment  
was then taken up. Councillor White  
went carefully over the items required,  
which in all totalled \$2250, this included  
hook and ladder truck, rubber coats and  
boots, shut off nozzle, alarm bell and tow-  
er, extra lanterns, boxes 500 feet hose,  
badges for firemen and two chemical en-  
gines.

Coun. Pinault thought that cards should  
be printed. Coun. Lunam said he would  
not vote against the bill, but thought that  
the hook and ladder truck was an absolute  
necessity; still they must not sacrifice pro-  
tection to economy. After much discus-  
sion it was at length ordered that the Fire  
committee purchase a hook and ladder  
truck, 12 rubber coats and boots and shut  
off nozzle, and despite the oratory of the  
silver tongued, eloquent chairman of the

## ROAD PROJECT MUCH DISCUSSED

Board of Trade Taking up  
Matter of Great Road in  
Earnest  
**PETITION FORWARDED**

A meeting well attended of the  
Campbellton Board of Trade was held  
in Murray's Hall, Monday evening.  
President Harquail in the chair.

The matter of charge in Telephone  
rates, by way of classification of ex-  
change was discussed. The council  
of the Board entered a protest against  
allowing the Telephone Co., to raise  
the rates without giving due notice.

W. D. Duncan explained the peti-  
tion being circulated re the opening  
up of Great Road No. 54. This road  
was laid out many years ago, and is  
settled for about twenty miles from  
Campbellton and about sixty miles  
from the St. John river. The route of  
this Great Road is the most feasible  
for all purposes and would open up a  
great territory. It would be of great  
benefit to Campbellton.

President Harquail said that he  
understood that there was consider-  
able opposition to the present propos-  
al. Many felt that it was useless to  
ask the government to expend a large  
sum of money on this project, espe-  
cially as the new settlements along the  
International would need a road. He  
was not in favor of any particular  
route, but thought that the petition  
should ask for something which had  
some prospect of being entertained.

W. D. Duncan said that he had  
been informed that the route proposed  
traversed a good agricultural district  
and it was for the opening up of new  
lands that roads were needed.

John Maclean thought that Great  
Road No. 54 promised the most direct  
route, and if it opened up good farm  
lands should be chosen. From what  
he knew of the I. N. R. route it would  
be a very hilly one.

F. M. Anderson objected to route  
of No. 54 on account of cost. He  
was confident no government would  
undertake its construction. For fifty  
miles it ran through the virgin forest.  
He favored the I. N. R. route. Settle-  
ments had sprung up along this route  
and these would demand a road.  
This route was already connected by a  
good portage road.

F. E. Blackhall agreed with Mr.  
Anderson.

Services in the new church will  
be held very soon, but the blessing  
will not take place till well on in  
the summer.


Gallagher moved that the suggestion
