The following judgments have been de-livered by Justice Cameron in the cases named, which were tried at the recent

Assizes.

Blackwood v. Milton. This was an action to recover the price of a fire engine sold by the plaintiff to the corporation of the town of Milton. The judge found that the defendants were a municipal corporation, but the seal of the corporation was not attached to the contract of purchase. It was also found that the corporation had no money, and had not struck any rate of assessment for the payment of the purchase money. It was found that there was delivery and ac-ceptance sufficient to bind an individual but not a municipal corporation. The judg-ment was for defendants, but without costs

of suit.

Ballie v. Dickson. Judgment for defendant on certain counts, and for plaintiff on Woodward v. Shields. This was an insolvency case. Judgement for defendant, with costs of suit.
